

DADDY WOULDN'T BUY HIM THE JUDGESHIP HE BEGGED FOR, SAYS WIFE

Would Cost Only \$10,000 and He'd Pay Back. Klein Wrote, She Declared.

Raymour Klein, chubby, stout and five years old, clambered up to the bar of justice and greeted Supreme Court Justice Hendrick this morning with a cheery "Hello, mister."

A bit embarrassed, the Justice asked him to go sit with his aunt, so that Raymour's mother, Mrs. Sadie Miller Klein, could give an uninterrupted flow of testimony in her suit for a separation from Emmanuel Klein, an attorney. Mrs. Klein is the daughter of Julius Miller, a retired real estate broker.

Raymour declined emphatically. Mrs. Klein, a pretty brunette, awarded the court that when Raymour said "No," that was final, as Justice Hendrick let the little fellow sit on the arm of the judicial chair to hear the tribulations of his father and mother.

Mrs. Klein said her husband made demands upon her parents for sums of \$2,500 to \$5,000. On one occasion, she testified, he demanded \$10,000 to "bribe" him to become Municipal Court Justice, and she produced this letter purporting to have been written by Klein to Mr. Miller in 1908:

"It is very well for you to tell me that you will give me money enough to bribe me to get a judgeship, but you now as well as I that I can get any money I wish should I get the nomination. Meantime I will not set any exact figure that I think you should give me, but I would suggest that it be not less than \$10,000. If I do get the nomination we will consider the matter as an end in return I will give you an assignment of my salary as Judge. This is so that when your other daughters are married they will not be able to come to you and throw in your face that you gave Sadie more money than you give them."

At this point Raymour grew weary of Justice Hendrick's chair-arm and dislodged his mother's lap and shoulders into a more interesting playground.

"Emmanuel and I were married on June 15," she went on, "and immediately after the wedding we went to the Bahamas. The next morning my father came down—Emmanuel had been for him—and my husband asked for \$2,500. Father said he would be a good fellow and sat down to write check.

"Our wedding journey lasted just five days. When we returned we went to Rockaway, and Emmanuel threatened to leave me unless I got \$15,000. When he increased it to \$25,000—then my father. He got mad then and let me for two months. When returned he did get \$2,500 from father.

"No sooner did he have this than he asked for \$5,000, and when father offered to give him a house with an equity of \$10,000, he said he must have an equity of \$50,000. Then he left me again for a while, and when he came back I let him pawn my jewelry, worth \$1,800. He didn't see him then for a year and a half. The last time we lived together he asked me brutally."

WOMAN BURNED TO DEATH.
Her Sleeve Catches Fire From a Gas Stove.

While Minnie Huron, who keeps house for her father and two sisters in a flat Seventh and Erie streets, Jersey City, was in the kitchen this afternoon she slipped on her dress over a burner on the gas stove and in an instant the flames had spread to her waist and skirt.

The young woman's screams brought Mrs. Dugan, who has a tailor shop on the ground floor. She was lying on the floor when she pushed in the door and apparently had stifled flames by being over the carpet. Before an ambulance arrived, however, Miss Huron was dead. She was twenty-six years old.

'NAMARA GOES TO CANADA.
Highest Court Refuses to Save Accused Bank Burglar.

The United States Supreme Court at Washington to-day declined to interfere with the removal by extradition of John Namara from New York to New Westminster, Canada, to answer to a charge of the larceny of an automobile. An attempt was first made to extradite Namara on a charge of stealing \$17,000 from the Bank of Montreal, and Namara fought the automobile extradition case on the ground that it was a subterfuge to try him for the alleged stealing of the money.

WILLIAM ROCKEFELLER DODGED A SUBPOENA IN KENNEL CLUB SUIT

Oil Millionaire Now Reported to Be at a Hotel in Nassau, Bahama Islands.

William Rockefeller's reputation as a subpoena dodger was enhanced in the Supreme Court to-day by the statement that the financier had evaded service for some months in the suit brought by Miss Rosalie Stewart to recover \$50,000 from the American Kennel Club as damages for an alleged slander. Rockefeller is one of the directors of the club, along with August Belmont and several other distinguished Wall Street men. The suit is on trial before Justice Hasbrouck in the Supreme Court.

Miss Stewart charges that the American Kennel Club circulated a slander by having published in the American Kennel Gazette a statement that she had diverted some of the funds of the Toy Spaniel Club, of which she was at one time an officer. The publication of the article was made about the time she sued the Toy Spaniel Club for \$20,000 damages for another alleged slander.

Several of the jurors were excused by Justice Hasbrouck because they admitted knowing members of the firm of Guggenheimer, Untermyer & Marshall, the lawyers who are defending the Kennel Club. One of the jurors sold a dog to Samuel Untermyer, one of the firm members. He was promptly excused.

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 6.—William Rockefeller, who has accepted service of a subpoena to appear as a witness before the Pajo Money Trust Investigating Committee, is at a hotel in Nassau, Bahama Islands, according to persons arriving here to-day. He has agreed to be in Washington Jan. 13.

Statements by steamship officials were to the effect that Mr. Rockefeller sailed from Miami on the steamer Miami last Thursday after arriving here from Palm Beach in the private car of President Parrott of the Florida East Coast Railroad.

\$15,000 MORE VOTED TO CURRAN FIGHT HUNT.
Aklermen Pass Appropriation After Smith Charges Chairman With False Statement.

The Board of Aldermen to-day voted an appropriation of \$15,000 for the uses of the Aldermanic Police Investigating Committee. Originally Chairman Curran of the committee asked for \$25,000, but the Finance Committee cut the sum, with the understanding that more money would be available when necessary.

The Curran Committee will resume its public sessions to-morrow. During the discussion of the appropriation Alderman Smith charged Chairman Curran with making a false statement to him with reference to the work of the investigating committee. Mr. Curran retorted hotly, but the Chairman's gavel put an end to the controversy. The money was voted for unanimously.
