

MOVIES SHOWED GIRLS HOW TO STEAL FURS; PAWBROKER HELPED

Loan Agent Told Them to Bring More of Their Loot to Him.

If the rules of criminology are not inexorable, it may be time to save two fresh faced little girls who at headquarters today sobbed out their very hearts under the shame of arrest for theft. They are Anita Marish, who lives at No. 25 Avenue A, and Katherine Cullen of No. 192 Waverly place; both are just seventeen.

Yesterday afternoon they were arrested in the Fourteenth Street Store as they were walking away with a fur coat they had lifted from a rack. Detectives had been on the lookout for these demure little misses, for twice within the week fur coats, valued at \$10 and \$12, had been stolen from the Simpson Crawford Company on Sixth Avenue. In each instance the coats had been missed after two slender little girls, with the faces of cherubs, had been noticed wandering about the cloak department.

A night in jail brought unknown terrors to the hearts of Anita and Katherine, and this morning when Capt. Himmern at Headquarters put an arm about each and said, "Now, tell me all about it," their stories tumbled from their lips fast as their tears flowed.

They had both worked during the Christmas holiday rush, one as packer in a department store, the other in a candy store; and when the holidays were over they were without positions. Also neither had a nickel in her purse to blouse herself with. They wanted to go to the "movies," so last Thursday Katherine pawned a cheap set of furs she had received for Christmas. She got \$2 for the furs and that gave a whole day's entertainment up at the flashy row of Fourteenth street.

HAD NO MORE MONEY, SO THEY STOLE.

"And then last Monday," sobbed Katherine, "we had no more money and I had seen in the movies how easy it was to steal things from stores, so we went to Simpson Crawford's and just took a wonderful fur coat off the rack and walked out with it. We went to a pawnshop and the man gave us \$5 for the coat. And he said: 'You look like clever little girls. When you do this again bring the stuff to me.'"

"So it was so easy we did it again in the same store on Wednesday and took the coat to the same pawnbroker. And we tried to take another yesterday, but we were caught. And now our mothers will know that we are thieves and we might as well be dead."

When the girls went to Jefferson Market Court they made an affidavit upon which the detectives could go out and arrest the kid pawnbroker who had helped the two little girls to realize on their stolen goods.
