Clause Added by Conferrees Raises Storm of Protest

on Floor.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 .- Because of alleged discriminations which would bar Jews from admission to the United States, the Immigration bill was re-

ciared that a clause added by the con-ferees which dir not appear in the hill as originally passed, would prevent the entrance of all desirable persons. This ciause, recommended by immigration officials, reads: "Citizens or subjects of any country

that issues penal certificates or certifi-cates of character who do not produce to the immigration officials such a cer-

This was inserted following the list of classes excluded from admission. It caused a debate of three hours and forced the rejection of the conference

Senator O'Gorman said the clause would encourage foreign countries to have laws enacted requiring certificates of character in order that their subjects may be prevented from entering the United States. It would reverse the American policy of expatriation on which this country has stood against the world for a hundred years. With a certificate of character requirement, he said foreign nations could prohibit their subjects from coming to this country. He said that a German or Russian who emigarted to evade military service aiready was classified at home as a criminal.






