

### HUSBAND AND WIFE IN AUTO RAID THEIR HUSBAND AND WIFE

Mrs. Junk and Mr. Ottman  
Cause Arrest of Mr. Junk  
and Mrs. Ottman in Flat.

Sergeant Edward Barry of the Bergen street station was interested by a man who was hanging about the front of an apartment house at No. 504 Union street, Brooklyn, before daylight today. While he was on his way to question him, two automobiles drove up, filled with men and women arrayed in fine furs; they were led by Mrs. D. F. Junk of No. 125, Sixth avenue, Brooklyn, and Louis Ottman, son of a Manhattan butcher, both very young and very angry.

They explained that the mysterious man was a detective and that they were about to raid an apartment recently leased by Mrs. Evelyn Ottman, though she had not separated from her husband, who lives at No. 1235 Pacific street.

The sergeant summoned several policemen to prevent disorder and the raid was made. When Ottman rang the bell of the apartment, his wife ran out in her nightgown and threw herself into Sergeant Barry's arms, begging for protection. She was closely followed by young Mr. Junk.

The raiding husband and wife insisted that the other pair be arrested on a criminal charge. They were held in \$200 bail each by Magistrate Reynolds, in Butler Street Court.

### PLEADS FOR SHAPIRO.

Whitman Asks Secretary of State to Restore License.

District-Attorney Whitman wrote to Secretary of State May to-day asking him to restore a chauffeur's license to William Shapiro, driver of the "gray murder car" in which the gunman rode the night Herman Rosenthal was killed.

Mr. Whitman recalled Shapiro's connection with the case and his discharge by Justice Goff, and said that not only was he convinced Shapiro

did not know the mission of his passengers, but he had also been a valuable witness against Rosenthal's slayers.

### FORMER BANK PRESIDENT MAKES AN ASSIGNMENT.

William F. Wyckoff of Defunct  
Woodhaven Institution Turns  
Property Over to Creditors.

There was filed to-day in the office of the County Clerk of Queens County in Jamaica, an assignment for the benefit of creditors of William F. Wyckoff of No. 90 Clinton avenue, Jamaica. He was President of the Woodhaven Bank that closed its doors about two months ago, while he was in Louisiana. He is in business as an attorney and counselor-at-law at No. 215 Montague street, Brooklyn.

Mr. Wyckoff transfers to Henry A. Meyer "all his real, personal, chattel, property and rights in action of every nature." Mr. Meyer, who resides at No. 2500 Newkirk avenue, Brooklyn, is to dispose of all the property, and the proceeds, after the lawful expenses for executing the trust and the wages of Wyckoff's employees have been paid, are to go to creditors.

Another instrument filed is signed by Wyckoff and his wife, Corrella. This assigns the rentals of a building at University place and Clinton place, Woodhaven, in which the bank was located, to Philip M. Wood, who has a mortgage on the property.

### WISNER TRIAL LETTERS CREATE A SENSATION.

Meyers in One Says Another Com-  
munication Was a Bluff to  
Placate Directors.

Assistant United States District-Attorney Arnold sprung a surprise to-day in the trial before Judge Mack and a jury of A. L. Wisner and Jann J. Meyers, accused of using the mails to defraud. Meyers was examined in his own defense yesterday and to-day Mr. Arnold, on cross-examination, asked him about several letters which had been sent by the Government for trump purposes. The letters were admitted in evidence following a volley of objections from counsel for the defense.

The letters in question, which were sent by Meyers to Wisner in 1904, had to do with affairs of the Black Oak Gold Mining Company, whose directors had become apprehensive because of the extravagant advertising done by Wisner and had insisted that Meyers call Wisner off.

One of the letters, "a personal and private" one to Wisner, tells him to pay no attention to the other one, written simply to placate the directors, "who would soon be got rid of anyway." The other letter, written to be exhibited to the directors before being mailed to Wisner, rebukes the latter for recklessness in advertising statements, and insists that a more moderate course be followed in the future.

### MRS. SAGE RESTORES AMBULANCES SEIZED AT THE POLYCLINIC

Check for \$5,000 Takes Ve-  
hicles and Surgical Instru-  
ments From Sheriff's Hands.

The generosity of Mrs. Russell Sage prevented the sale to-day of the automobile ambulances and surgical instruments of the Polyclinic Hospital, which were seized about three weeks ago by Sheriff Harbinger to satisfy a judgment in favor of Nathan J. Packard for \$12,500.

The hospital authorities communicated their plight to Mrs. Sage, and met a prompt response. She forwarded her check for \$5,000 to the hospital. Mr. Packard accepted that amount in part payment of his debt against the institution and was told that the remainder soon would be made up. The Sheriff then withdrew a deputy who had been stationed at the hospital since the execution was placed in his hands.

### DISABLED VESSEL SAVED.

Linear Devonian Picks Up the  
Mexico and Tows it to Port.

A wireless message received to-day by the French Line from the freighter Mexico, reported helpless in mid-ocean yesterday because of a broken propeller, states the vessel has been picked up by the Leyland liner Devonian and is being towed to Halifax.

The Mexico, which carries no passengers, left here a week ago to-day for Dunkirk, France. The Devonian left Boston last Saturday for Liverpool. Capt. Trant of the Devonian steamed 20 miles to pick up the Mexico, in response to a wireless call for help.

### M'CABE, WILEY'S FOE, QUILTS. Storm Centre in Pure Food War Resigns His Office.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Resignation of George F. McCabe as solicitor of the Department of Agriculture to take effect on March 4 was announced by Secretary Wilson to-day. McCabe was one of the storm centres in the controversy over administration of the Pure Food law which finally culminated in Dr. Harvey W. Wiley's resignation as chief chemist.

As a member of the Pure Food Board, Wiley charged that McCabe hampered his work and deliberately created friction. Secretary Wilson stated that he accepted McCabe's resignation with regret. The solicitor announced that he would open a law office in Portland, Ore.
