Elizabeth R. Foutney-Gyles-Carrol, although twice married and twice divorced, became again plain Elizabeth Foutney and remarried to-day when Justice Bijur decided to confirm the report of Referee Phoenix Ingraham, which recommended that the young woman's secret marriage to Thomas M. Carrol in Hoboken, Dec. 17, 1911, be declared null and void because Mrs. Carrol had not completely shed her first spouse.

It was proved that Carrol and Mrs. Gyles were wedded two weeks after she had obtained from Justice Truxon an involuntary decree annulling her marriage to Gyles, who is a prosperous merchant living at No. 89 Barclay street, Brooklyn.

REAL LONDON MUSIC HALL, PALACE THEATRE, OPENED.

Protections, Well Appointed Amusement House Presents 'The Eternal Waltz' and 'Good Vaudeville Bill.'

Another music hall for New York, more like dear old London than any the city had seen before, was opened last night. Even the name—the Palace Theatre—was an importation. It is a roomy and commodious house, with ample seats, open foyer and lounge. Architecturally it leaves nothing to be desired, and 1,000 pleasure seekers admired it last night behind "Diamond Jim" Brady, who sat in the front row.

Among the unusual features are the enormous size of the stage and the number of boxes extending around both sides of the house. The decorations of old ivory and bronze are especially handsome. The entertainment was high class vaudeville. One of the features, "The Eternal Waltz," a complete musical comedy, was elaborately staged, and the music was brought to perfection by utilizing the English brass for Vienna waltzes, but would have been far more up to date on both sides of the water with ragtime as its objective. It is the production of Leo Fall, the Vienna composer. Another feature was a sketch, "Speaking to Father," by George Ade. By Mayer, the comic artist, was a new-comer to vaudeville with original sketches and stories put over in the best style known to the art department.

"The Palace Girls" made a charming picture in a stage setting of black and white. One Olga, "violinist at the Spanish Court," furnished another example of King Alfonso's acrobatic. The sensational climax of the night was La Napierowska, a wringing dancer. One feature of the opening was the activity of the speculators who were permitted to stand alongside the box office and collect patronage from the theatre.
