

**DR. FRIEDMANN PICKS 25 PATIENTS IN SETON HOSPITAL**

**Pulmonary Tuberculosis Cases to Be Treated in Further Federal Tests.**

Dr. F. F. Friedmann went to the Seton Hospital for Consumptives at Spuyten Duyvil to-day with his assistant, Dr. Sturm, and Drs. Stimson and Lavender, representing the Federal Government, to look over a hundred cases selected for him by the Sisters and physicians there. He made a selection of twenty-five or more typical pulmonary cases to be inoculated with the curie anti-tuberculosis vaccine early next week.

Dr. Friedmann's fame was all that saved him from appearing in a police court to-day to answer a charge of automobile speeding. With Dr. Sturm, he was driving down Broadway at Eighteenth street yesterday at a rate which caused a policeman to hold them up. Dr. Sturm explained who Dr. Friedmann was and that his arrest or detention in court would interrupt the important tests of his treatment which are being made here, and the policeman let the two go on with a warning.

**MILITANT MAUD MALONE'S CONVICTION IS UPHELD**

Appellate Division Rules She Was Properly Fined for Disturbing a Political Meeting in Brooklyn.

Militant Maud Malone, New York's champion meeting disturber, has been warned by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, that she must not try to break up political meetings.

While Woodrow Wilson, gas addressing a meeting in the Academy of Music, Brooklyn, last fall Miss Malone rose from her seat and hurled a "How about equal suffrage?" at the candidate. She was arrested, convicted in Special Sessions and sentence was suspended, but her attorney, James B. Kohler, succeeded in having a fine of \$5 imposed in lieu that he might appeal.

To-day the Appellate Division, in an opinion written by Justice Jenks and concurred in by Justices Thomas, Burr, Carr and Stapleton, affirmed the conviction.

**GOLD-PAVED STREETS.**

Recently an American mining engineer was looking over some abandoned gold smelters at Mazapil, an old Mexican town buried in the mountains. When he returned to civilization he carried with him several bricks from the buildings of Mazapil and some samples of slag which he turned over to the company's assayer.

The mining engineer has suspected that with the crude mining operations in vogue at the time of the former operations there would be some loss in extracting the gold from the ore, but he was hardly prepared for the assayer's report, stating that the bricks and slag ran nearly \$50 to the ton, gold and silver and copper. He reported the matter to his company, and a quiet investigation was ordered, where it was ascertained that the assayer's figures were not exaggerated in the least, and that the streets of Mazapil were literally paved with gold and silver, to say nothing of a high percentage of the baser metals, copper, lead and zinc.

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
