

**"QUICK RICH" BROKER
GETS LIGHT SENTENCE
TO CURE DRINK HABIT**

Judge Martin "Touched" by
Jacoby's Appearance on
Verge of Delirium Tremens.

A touch of pathos softened the atmosphere of the criminal branch of the United States District Court to-day in the scene attending the sentencing by Judge Martin of Ralph M. Jacoby, formerly an investment banker and broker at No. 40 Wall Street, convicted by a jury yesterday of using the mails to defraud by means of "get-rich-quick" schemes.

The jury recommended that the court exercise extreme clemency on Jacoby, who throughout the ten days of his trial, according to a physician who examined him, has appeared in court on the verge of collapse, due to excessive use of intoxicants.

It also developed today that Jacoby, who is forty-three years old, has a sick wife, thirty-three years his senior, and is reputed to be wealthy.

Glenn M. Conzel, attorney for Jacoby, appealed to the Judge to impose a fine and suspend prison sentence. Conzel said Jacoby's wife, who is seventy-six years old, is bedridden in her Atlantic City home.

The attorney also said Jacoby's father, H. S. Jacoby, who is a banker of Stroudsburg, Pa., is past eighty-two years and that his son's troubles already brought him much suffering.

"The sight of Jacoby's father, standing by his son in his trial and the circumstances of his bedridden wife and the fact that the defendant has appeared in court, as Dr. Pritchard reported, on the verge of delirium tremens, have all touched me. But the physician has informed me that restraint is the best thing possible for him in his present condition. The New York County penitentiary has special facilities for taking care of just such cases, and the authorities and doctors there have agreed to arrange for special attention for this defendant. I believe one year in the New York penitentiary will be the best thing possible for Jacoby, and that shall be his sentence."

SOLD DRINK ON BROADWAY.

Detectives Arrest Man for Serving
Liquor on Sunday.

Frank Sassek, a waiter, employed at Michael's cafe at Broadway and Forty-second street, was in the Jefferson Market Police Court to-day charged with violating the excise law. Detectives Sexton and McManus testified that Sassek had sold them drinks in the cafe at 11 o'clock on Sunday night. Michael, the man's employer, admitted that the drinks were sold and said that he wanted to have a magistrate's hearing on the case. He asked for a postponement until he could get a lawyer. This was granted and Sassek's bail was fixed at \$50.

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
