Mr. Frame was the complaining witness to-day in General Sessions before Judge Rosalaky against Michael Kelly, who has been convicted of pocket-picking eight times and is accused by Mr. Frame of taking a gold commissioner's badge from his pocket on a Fourteenth street car at Fourth avenue on Dec. 30. "I knew from the feeling in my pocket that a thief was at work," said the witness, "and I grabbed his wrist. This was the man whose wrist I caught."
"How could you know," asked Judge Rosalaky, interrupting the witness, "that a thief's hand was at work?"
"By three previous experiences with similar people," said Mr. Frame, "one of them being Jack Zelig, of whom you may have heard, sir."
"You may proceed," said Judge Rosalaky with a smile.
Kelly was convicted and his sentence was postponed until April 21.

MOTHER SEEKS MISSING SON AFTER POLICE FAIL.

Mrs. Hughes Goes to Philadelphia to Hunt Student, Not Seen Since Saturday Night.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., April 14.—Alarmed by the continued absence of her son, Caleb C. Hughes, a sophomore at the Jefferson Medical College, who disappeared Sunday, the mother of the young man came here from New York to-day and renewed her efforts to find him.
Hughes, who is twenty-three years old, left the home of his sweetheart, Miss Letty Gibbs, No. 2228 South Sixty-eight street, Saturday night, with a check for \$100 in his possession. He announced his intention of having his check cashed and started ostensibly for his boarding house, No. 322 South Fifth street, Darby. Hughes has not been seen since.
He is the son of Caleb C. Hughes, an Assistant District Engineer in the New York Fire Department, and the family home is at No. 720 East Two Hundred and Twentieth street, the Bronx.

KEEP CATTLE CARS OFF RIVERSIDE DRIVE TRACK, COURT ORDERS

Property Owner Wins His Suit Against Obnoxious Use of a Siding.

Supreme Court Justice Page decided to-day that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company no longer can store cattle cars on a siding below Riverside Park, opposite One Hundred and Fifth street. The Court granted to George L. Willson an injunction prohibiting the use of the riverfront tracks for this purpose and also awarded to Mr. Willson nominal damages of six cents against the railroad.


Mr. Willson, who owns vacant premises at the Drive and One Hundred and Fifth street, sued to compel the railroad to remove its tracks on the ground that the tracks had invaded park lands. He claimed that the "atmosphere along Riverside Drive was polluted with a foul stench; that engines emit ash, cinders, oil and water and obnoxious gases and smoke, which penetrate the plaintiff's premises."

"As a common carrier," the Court declared, "the defendant must transport live stock. As an incident to such transfer, it is probably necessary that these cars should stand upon sidings at destination, but the use of the sidings in a residential district is not justified."
Justice Page held that, inasmuch as Mr. Willson's property is vacant, no substantial damage has resulted.

Dies Entertaining Friends.
WILMINGTON, Del., April 14.—While entertaining a party of prominent residents of Philadelphia at the Holly Oak Club along the Delaware River near here, Howard Lippincott Haines, fifty-eight, of Philadelphia, wealthy retired real estate broker, was stricken with apoplexy and died at the club house early to-day.


