

AUTOISTS WALLOW IN MILK AT CRASH; GIRL UNCONSCIOUS

Wagon, Car, Bottles and Passengers All Mixed Up in Big Street Puddle.

200 QUARTS SPILLED.

Young Woman in "Red Riding Hood" Cloak Found Dying in Street, Merely Stunned.

A wrecked milk wagon, with the horse kicking in the shafts; a partially demolished automobile, a young woman dressed in a "Red Riding Hood" cloak lying unconscious in the street and four men painfully trying to stand on their feet—the whole scene splashed and whitewashed with milk—was the sight that greeted the Hotel Herford, Eighty-first street and Central Park West, looked upon when they ran to their windows on being awakened by a loud crash in front of the hotel early to-day.

Policemen Bennett and Rooney quickly appeared and carried "Red Riding Hood" to the sidewalk. She was still unconscious, but not hurt, so far as the policemen could see. The men limped over and looked at her anxiously.

As soon as the young woman had been got out of the street, Bennett and Rooney attacked the horse, which was about to complete, with its hoofs, the demolition of the milk wagon, already badly battered by the automobile.

FIND "RED RIDING HOOD" WAS ONLY STUNNED.

A call sent to Polytechnic Hospital, brought Dr. Pryor in an ambulance. He revived "Red Riding Hood," who had only been stunned. Then she and the four men, all of whom walked painfully, were taken to the West Sixty-eighth street police station.

There the young woman said she was Miss May Post, nineteen years old, of No. 124 East One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street. One of the men said he was James Fisher, a contractor, of No. 125 Third avenue. The automobile was his, he said, and Miss Post and two of the men had been his guests in a late supper at a downtown restaurant. They were on their way home.

The men guests in the machine said they were Stephen Barrett of No. 118 Simpson street, and Edward Leopold of No. 27 East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street.

The milk wagon driver was Joseph Falkenstein of No. 145 Madison avenue. He was treated at the police station by Dr. Pryor for a gash on the head. No one else had injuries other than bruises. The horse attached to Falkenstein's wagon was cut, however.

200 QUARTS OF MILK SPILLED OVER THE PARTY.

At first Fisher said the milk wagon was in the middle of the street and had no lights behind.

"I was going about fifteen miles an hour," he said, "and didn't see the wagon until it was too late to stop. I ran squarely into it."

Later Fisher amended his statement by saying the milk wagon cut across his path.

It was evident from the manner in which the wagon was shoved forward on the haunches of the kicking and struggling horse that the blow against it had been directly from the rear.

"I had two hundred quarts of milk on the wagon," said Falkenstein, and it was apparent from the condition of the street, the wrecked vehicles and the clothes of all persons who had been in the accident that at least that quantity of milk had been spilled.

No arrests were made.

AUSTRALIA'S TENNIS TEAM CAPTAIN HERE AFTER THE DAVIS CUP.

Stanley N. Doust, captain of the Australian tennis team which will compete here on June 6, 7 and 8 for the Davis Cup, arrived from England to-day on the White Star liner *Maestri*.
