

THREAT OF DEATH FOUND IN PATERSON WRITTEN ON WALL

Police Begin Round-Up of "Strong Arm" Men They Say the Strikers Imported.

A murder threat, written with an indelible pencil in letters seven inches high on a placard several feet square, was found nailed to a telegraph pole at River and Lafayette streets, Paterson, N. J., this morning, and private detective and members of the city police force are trying to discover the author of the threat. It read: "Aaronson is trying to force us back to the four looms. He must be killed."

The operation of four looms by a man is one of the points on which the present silk strike is based. The owners say an operator can manage four looms as well as two. The weavers declare two looms tax a man's strength and skill to the utmost.

There are three mill owners named Aaronson in Paterson. Samuel J. Aaronson is a member of the firm of Aaronson & Co. Bernard is a partner in Aaronson brothers and Harry is senior member of Aaronson & Bloom. Detectives are guarding these men against possible danger, for there is no indication of which of the three was meant in the placard.

There was no disorder this morning when the workers entered such mills as are making a pretense of working. Policemen were on hand at every mill, but they found nothing to do, as there was almost no picketing.

Special squads of detectives have been assigned to run down the gangs of professional pickets and strong arm men whom the police suspect the strikers of having imported into Paterson. The police learned to-day that Leo Van Tilburg, a painter having no connection with the strikers, had been beaten and his body bruised so badly that he is still confined in St. Joseph's Hospital. Van Tilburg said his assailants were his brother, Adolph, a dye house foreman, who did not strike, probably earned his beating. He was set upon near his home on his way home and was passing East Main and Hillman streets. Friends found him after his assailants had left him unconscious.

Sergeant Moore and several detectives picked up four men in the Riverside section this morning whom they suspected of being imported strong arm men. All gave Paterson addresses, however. Arthur W. McNab, a mill foreman, who was knocked from his motorcycle and badly beaten last Thursday, identified one of them, Ruffano Marsaro, as one of the band who had attacked him, and William Von Rindt and Servino Douno were identified as members of the band who attacked Policeman Nathaniel Love last night. Recorder Carroll held them each in \$5.00 bail for the Grand Jury.

Leaders of the Industrial Workers of the World announced that "Mother" Mary Jones, fresh from the West Virginia mine fields, would address the strikers to-morrow night. William B. Killenback, State Secretary of the Socialist party, would here a hall. It was said, and invite "Mother" Jones to speak as to circumvent the police, who have prevented the strikers from hiring halls.

Commenting on a view of the violence which the strike has caused when many of them, waiting at the Erie station, saw Policeman O'Brien and Martin Mast fight all over the street for several minutes. At least the policeman knocked Mast almost senseless and arrested him.

HORSE KILLS STABLE BOY.

William Smith is Thrown and Fatally Hurt at Belmont.

William Smith, a stable boy employed in the J. E. Widener racing stables at Belmont Park, was killed to-day when the horse he was taking over the jumps in the steeplechase course stumbled and threw him fifteen feet. His head struck the stone face of an abutment nearby. The horse was Flatter, a crack steeplechaser, which has been under training for the revival of racing at the Belmont track next Friday. Smith was nineteen years old and had been a stableboy and jockey in the employ of the Widener stables for several months. Smith was unconscious when picked up and died in the ambulance that was taking him to Jamaica Hospital.

FOUND BLEEDING TO DEATH.

Sailor Accused of Trying Suicide by Slashing Wrist.

A man who said he was John Thomas, thirty-six, a sailor living at No. 121 Emory street, Brooklyn, and refused to say anything more about himself, was found about 3 o'clock this morning sitting on the curb at North Moore and West streets bleeding from a gash in the right wrist. A razor lay at his feet. Policeman Garrison used his nightstick as a tourniquet until the arrival of Dr. Crane, who took the man to the Hudson Street Hospital. Afterward Thomas was locked up at the Leonard street station and he will be arraigned at the Tombs Court on a charge of attempted suicide.
