

WILSON AND CHINDA MEET TO DISCUSS JAPAN'S ANSWER

Bryan Gives His Views to President Before His Talk With Mikado's Ambassador.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—President Wilson arranged a conference at 4 o'clock to-day with Viscount Chinda, the ambassador from Japan, to discuss the Tokyo Government's latest note of protest against the California anti-alien land law. It is the first time that the Ambassador has availed himself of his privilege of addressing himself directly to the President of the United States as the personal representative of his sovereign, Emperor Meiji.

It also was arranged that Secretary Bryan should confer with President Wilson before the Ambassador is received, but it was not contemplated that he would be present later. Mr. Bryan will give to the President his views of Japan's rejoinder to the last note of the United States, reiterating that the California law is a discrimination and in contravention of the treaty of 1881, notwithstanding the disclaimer of the State Department.

Japan's latest word in her protest was given President Wilson to-day waiting to be presented to the cabinet at its regular semi-weekly meeting to-morrow. It is more than probable that the cabinet will consider the rejoinder only in a preliminary way, as Secretary Bryan is expected to leave the city even after the meeting for Pittsburgh to attend a banquet to George W. Guthrie, the newly appointed Ambassador to Japan. Viscount Chinda, Japan's Ambassador, also will be a guest at the function, but will go on an earlier train.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—A letter from Viscount Chinda, explaining his views on the California-Japan situation, will be read by Secretary of State William J. Bryan at the farewell dinner to George W. Guthrie, Ambassador to Japan, here to-morrow night. Mr. Bryan's address is also expected to deal directly with the Japanese situation. Viscount Chinda will speak before the dinner, which will be given at the Waldorf-Astoria by A. Mitchell Palmer of Pennsylvania, William B. Wilson, Secretary of Labor, and James I. Buchanan, Fourth Assistant Postmaster-General.

NEW ADMINISTRATION TO ENFORCE STRICTLY ALL PURE FOOD LAWS

So Declares Dr. Aisberg, Head of Bureau of Chemistry, in Address.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 8.—There has been and will be no step backward in the enforcement of the pure food law under the new administration, Dr. Carl L. Aisberg, Chief of the Bureau of Chemistry, to-day told the National Wholesale Grocers' Association in annual session here. He added, however, that "the administration of the law will gain in effectiveness if coupled with a policy of education and instruction."

Dr. Aisberg said he hoped to make the chemistry bureau as valuable to the consumer as the Department of Agriculture, as a whole, has been to the farmer.

"One of the great needs of the time," he continued, "is more science in the manufacture of foods. Here in the United States, the business of food manufacture has advanced with extraordinary rapidity. We no longer 'live at home,' as they say in the South. Our table is dependent on the distant grower, the distant manufacturer. The food problem is not a problem of the home or even of the locality. It is a problem of the nation wide."

"The transformation of the food industry has been so rapid that abuses could not fall to creep into it. The old household methods are often not when applied on a large scale. New methods had to be devised. Under pressure of competition, these have not always been thoroughly tested. Thus trade practices have become established that are hard to eradicate. It must be one of the duties of the Department of Agriculture to examine into all of these processes, to improve good ones, and discover substitutes for the bad. It must also be its function to develop methods of utilizing by-products and of using

as food many things which are not now utilized. Much work of this type already has been done in the Department of Agriculture, but it is hoped to make this work the dominant note of the Bureau's policy."

Mayor's Pardon "Piper" Cost \$250,000.

HATPINS THEIR WEAPONS.
Girls Use Them on Strikers Who Try to Keep Them From Work.

SEAZLETON, Pa., June 8.—Girls employed at the shirt factory of J. Gerhardt & Co. to-day continued the use of hatpins when approached by pickets of the United Mine Workers and other unions to urge them to remain away from the factory. In a clash at West Hazleton a number of pickets, among them some of the girl strikers, were scratched with hatpins in the fight to take these weapons from the operative.

One girl worker was arrested on a charge of threatening to use a pin on a policeman. Her sister was almost stripped to the waist in a fight. It is charged that the pickets tried to prevent girls from getting on trolley cars to go to work.
