Boxing Clubs May Close for Summer Months

The Boxing Commission proposes to give club managers and fighters a three-months' vacation and suspend all boxing exhibitions during the summer months. The Commissioners seriously considered a suggestion raised at their regular weekly meeting to advise all club owners to refrain from giving shows during the months of June, July and August. The unions believe that the fans get enough of the sport in the fall and winter, and with the competing of outdoor games but few care to sit in hot, stuffy clubs and see two boxers trying to change each other's maps. The Commissioners plan to get the opinion of club managers on the subject and if the project is favorably received, to order the cessation of the mitt sport next year in order to give the club owners sufficient time to readjust their leases. Completing the day's business, the Commissioners presented Billy Gibson a handsome gold watch for his recognition of his services in handling the Commission's fund in aid of the sufferers of the recent Ohio floods. Mike Schreck Wins Bout. CINCINNATI, O., June 11.—Mike Schreck, the Reading, Pa. heavyweight, "came back" and outpointed Billy Sparks in a fifteen-round contest held in Elmwood place. The fight was rather slow. Sparks, a former heavyweight champion of the Cincinnati Gymnasium, has been fighting in New York and Philadelphia under the name of Billy Ryan.
