

WOMEN ACCUSED OF WORKING NEW MARRIAGE GAME

Janet Foster and Her Daughter Taken By Post Office Authorities.

SCHEME COINED MONEY.

Advance of Fare and Helps to Settle Old Wills Catches Dupes.

Highborn out Jamaica way who used to wonder where Mrs. Janet Foster, 55, and her daughter, Mrs. Laura Foster, thirty, of No. 27 Willow street, got all their nice clothes and jewels were surprised to-day. Both women were arrested and placed in a taxicab by transfer to Brooklyn by Post-Office Inspector G. M. Brown and Deputy United States Marshal J. R. Mackway, charged with using the mails to defraud. These same neighbors had noticed large sums of mail coming to the woman daily, but could not make out what it was all about.

Post-Office inspectors tried to see what they could make of it, and soon concluded that the two women were running a matrimonial agency along highly developed lines. According to Inspector Brown, the women had a system that would have done credit to any up-to-date business house. Letters written by dupes from all over the country are in possession of the inspector now, and he says their contents tell a remarkable story.

GAY WIDOWS AND WIDOWERS WERE THEIR CUPES

Mrs. Foster and her daughter will be arraigned before United States Commissioner Cahoon late this afternoon. The inspectors who traced their movements say they worked the game by advertising in country newspapers asking for work as housekeeper to a widower or as visits looking for husbands. The replies came thick and fast, as fast in fact that they stopped the Postmaster, W. B. Adams, of Jamaica, who suggested an investigation.

Property hit the two women suddenly and the way the inspectors account for it is by charging that the women obtained money from their prospective husbands on various pretenses.

About forty letters in the possession of the authorities show the requests made in systematic fashion. The first appeal was usually for money to complete the amount needed for a ticket to get them out West where the main one waited. The next spoke of a sick child; the third follow-up letter told of a matrimonial agency along highly developed lines. It was signed "your intended wife," Laura Mayers. Another letter to W. C. Fildworth of Katamans, Mich., concluded with him on his immediate side, told him how much the writer loved his picture. "Send me \$5 to help pay for my ticket and I will put the rest to use" ran the letter.

THREE PERSONS INJURED WHEN TRUCK HITS CAR

Motor, Blocked by Steam Roller, Shears Trolley and Causes Damage.

When a heavy automobile truck and a southbound Sixth avenue car came together in a sudden and violent collision at the corner of sixth avenue and Thirty-eighth street, near 3 o'clock this afternoon, one of the passengers on the car was so seriously hurt by the almost complete amputation of one foot that he may die. Two others were badly crushed and cut.

Arcelis Hoffman of No. 128 Vine street, Paterson, N. J., was driving the auto truck, the property of the McNab and Harlin Manufacturing Company of Paterson, eastward on Thirty-eighth street when he started to cross the Sixth avenue tracks. A steam roller suddenly blocked his way. He threw on his brake when half of his truck was still on the tracks. Patrick McMullen, motorman of the approaching Sixth avenue car, could not reverse his car quickly enough to prevent the threatened collision.

The fore part of the car passed in safety, but the side struck the front of the truck, slewed it around against an elevated pillar, and the rear of the truck cut a way through the side of the car so as to carry the first three seats on one side of the aisle before it. Those sitting there were pinned in a mass of wreckage.

The passengers who were sitting directly behind the shearing metal of the truck rushed screaming for the rear exit. Three lay on the car floor, unconscious.

about. It was with difficulty that Policeman Dunn of the West Third street station and volunteers from the street raised the crushed members from the three injured positions and carried them to a nearby drug store, there to await the coming of a New York Hospital ambulance, with Dr. Schrock attending.

The first wounded passenger removed was Sol. Angelo of No. 24 West Forty-seventh street. His right foot was nearly severed from the ankle and he was rapidly bleeding to death when the policeman made a tourniquet with his club and thence stopped the flow of blood. Mrs. Beryl Gerard of No. 122 West Fifty-third street and M. A. Vandervegh of Rockaway Beach were both badly crushed and cut by glass and splinters.

No arrests were made, as it was clearly shown that the collision was the result of an unavoidable accident.
