

BOY SCOUTS SEIZE HUNTER ISLE AND CAMP LIKE INJUNS

Play at Redskins and Pirates Bold and Shoo Off All Intruders.

LIVE IN 20 ARMY TENTS.

New York Lads Drill Hard, but Find Time to Swim, Boat and Hunt.

Hunter Island, the densely wooded mound that fringes the western shore of Pelham Bay, is infested with "pirates" and "red skins," and city folk who are in the habit of journeying to the bay to pass their Sundays in shooting, fishing and picnicking had better steer clear of the island for at least three weeks.

Never has the island buzzed with life as it does this week. The place seems to have been peopled overnight with these pirates and red skins, who are covered, but very agile. Even the crows of quail, who have been the sole inhabitants of the island season after season, have flown to other parts, that the newcomers might be left severely alone.

Then, perhaps, you'll pull away, and as you are leaving look back. You'll see half a hundred red bandanna covered heads dodge out from behind trees and bushes and another fifty painted redskins push their way to the shore through the thicket. Then this motley crowd will stand grinning triumphantly at you until your boat is out of sight.

Well, these pirates of Hunter Island and these Indians are not such a bad sort after you have made their acquaintance, as an Evening World reporter and photographer, who stole upon the island yesterday, did. Beneath those red bandannas and the green paint are to be found the sun-burned faces of the members of the New York City section of the Boy Scouts of America, who have picked out an ideal spot on the island to spend three or four weeks this summer with their scout masters. They are only pirates and Indians when they are at play, and there is plenty of that at "Camp Higgins," as the "diggins" has been called. They have absolute control over the island while the camp remains, and there isn't a landing place on the island that is not "covered" by a scout sentinel.

Yesterday the last of twenty army tents was pitched on a stretch of rolling ground bordered in and sheltered by a grove of birch trees. Here the boys are having the time of their young lives, swimming, pirating, playing Indian, rowing, tramping, scouting, fishing, clamming, eating green apples and greener pears and yelling their heads off, which they couldn't do at home.

In the center of the camp headquarters tent has been pitched and from this Camp Master A. G. Clark, a ruddy faced Englishman, sees to it that the regimen of scout discipline is followed out to the letter. Down a path, in a sort of cavern in the woods—that might have been inhabited by bears and lions once upon a time—is the guardhouse, and any boy who gets in there will have his wife jolly well scared out of him, even if he is a brave little scout. Further down the path, at the beach, is the swimmin' hole, and such a grand place with a spring board, a fine sand beach and five rowboats with which to mess around in the water. Whoever laid out the camp must have figured that when the boys going to the swimmin' hole passed the dismal guardhouse they would be more than gently reminded that unless they obeyed the bugle and quit the swimmin' hole on the dot they would more than likely see the inside of the camp cookhouse. 'Tis to date the place has not held a prisoner.

JEM, CAMP COOK, WINS POPULARITY PRIZE. Went to the swimmin' hole the most popular place in camp is the screened-in mess room, and "Jem," the camp cook, is really monarch of all he surveys. His camp stew is "perfectly wonderful"—in by language—and his griddle cakes can't be surpassed. And, what is more, there is no limit to the helpin', and that goes for the thick berry and cherry pie, too.

"Fill a kid's stomach and you can lead him into a fire," is Jem's idea of how boys can be held in check. But playing is not the only thing that's done at Camp Higgins. A big sign on the bulletin board at headquarters tells of other things the boys must do in order to keep out of the guardhouse. There are two hundred boys now at the camp and every one knows this bulletin by heart.

At 8.30, according to bulletin, the reveille sounds and at 8.45 every scout, clad in his khaki uniform, must be ready for the ceremonies that follow. At 8.50 the flag is raised and then come the setting up exercises. At 9 they pile into "Jem's" mess tent, and at 9.55 every pair of blankets in the camp must be airing on the tent ropes. The routine detail is then arranged. From 8 o'clock until 11.30 the scout
