

RULER OF ELKS GETS BIG WELCOME IN FULTON MARKET

Flags Flying, Band Playing as Ed Leach Returns Covered With Glory.

EULOGY FROM FISH BOX.

Hero Doesn't Know What to Make of It, but Takes His Honors Modestly.

Fulton Market to-day welcomed Edward Leach on his return from Rochester, where, after a hot fight on July 7, he was elected Grand Exalted Ruler of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks for one year. Sometimes people may think there is no neighborhood spirit in New York. Nobody who saw the whole-hearted, almost riotous show in the truck-crowded neighborhood about Front and Beekman streets in the middle of the furious would ever dare to utter the thought that a New England village could show more united good feeling for the success of a fellow townsmen.

Mr. Leach, outgoing in hand, he has been in Syracuse "having fun," one of his admirers explained, ever since his election—walked down front street from his office at half-past nine o'clock. He saw the street strung with streamers. He saw the front of his own red brick fish warehouse festooned with flags. He saw flags fluttering from the windows of twenty other shops of those he has fought in the fish business, from hotel and restaurant supply shops, from the stores of those who deal in olive oil and from cooperage houses. He took one look at the broad banner inscribed:

WELCOME EDWARD LEACH, G. R. E. P. O. ELKS.

Then he scuttled up to his office through halls walled with American flags and the white and purple colors of the Elks.

Ed Leach came in a fish-encased white cap and broad, grinning face. William B. Wilson, son of Luke S. Wilson, the head-bellows and the head of the rival fish firm of Wilson & Barry.

Harry Trim of the Hunter & Trim Company, also rival of Mr. Leach, entered. "Oh, Grand Exalted Ruler!" he shouted from the door, "must I come in on my hands and knees, or must I merely sit down?"

"Come in," said Mr. Leach, who was now blushing to the purple stage, "you seemed fool and tell me what is coming off."

Mr. Trim came forward, shook hands and vanished with a flourish. Mr. Leach's eye fell on his secretary, Frederick C. Reynolds, who had slipped in quietly and was fawning with the books.

"Fred," he snapped, "have you had anything to do with this?"

"No, no, no," said Mr. Reynolds, trying cheerfully after having worked with Bill Wilson, Harry Trim, the butcher, Jim Smith (fish dealer, next door), and a score of others since Saturday night putting up the decorations.

IT WAS HARD WORK GETTING DOWN TO BUSINESS.

Mr. Leach turned to his desk and slit his hand and looked foolish for half an hour except when he was thanking persons with long white duck coats who came in and grabbed him by the hand and said, "Congratulations, Ed," and then ran out.

Every noon there was a noise of a band from Water street and up through Beekman street came a procession of men in those long white coats (Bill Wilson had borrowed a clean one from young Bill Ottman) and every man had a rooster plume cap on his head. Out in front, three abreast, were Luke Wilson, the grand old man of the market; George T. Moon, G. W. Wilson, Richard T. Wilson (who buys for the famous Blackford's fish concern); Barney Cohen, young Bill Ottman and other leaders in the market's activity. Not the least conspicuous, also with a rooster cap on his head, was Bob the Walter, of Brown's restaurant. Mr. Leach is a clean cut, athletic young man with just a touch of gray in his hair, but he was tired when it was through.

The spirit of the occasion was best expressed when the parade was halted for a moment by Henry Douglas, who got in the way with a tray of seaweed-packed soft crabs, borne on his head.

"One side, Steezy, one side!" cried Jimmy the Dogfish, who is also a market porter, but was assisting the police in clearing the way. "This is no place for no crabs."
