

KING GEORGE PRESIDES OVER ORDER OF BATH; REVIVES OLD CUSTOM

Knights in Brilliant Raiment Hold First Chapter Called in 98 Years.

LONDON, July 22.—King George's love of pageantry was again shown today when he presided over a Chapter of the Order of the Bath in King Henry VII's Chapel, Westminster Abbey, it being the first chapter of the order called in ninety-eight years. The Order of the Bath is the second oldest of the orders of chivalry, having been founded by King Henry IV. in 1399. Fifty years after King Edward III. instituted the Order of the Garter.

The original Knights of the Bath had the duty of tending and guarding the sovereign while he was taking his morning tub, but King George is not likely to call upon any of to-day's company for such service.

The ceremony of installing the Knights Grand Cross and the Knights Commanders in their respective pews over each of which waved the silken banner of the occupant, was private, but huge crowds gathered outside the Abbey to watch the arrival of the knights, who made a brave show in their red velvet cloaks, jeweled collars and stars of the order.

The Duke of Connaught, as Grand Master, occupied the place of honor at the King's right and the roll was called by Sir Spencer Ponsonby-Fane, Bath King-of-Arms, whose services in that capacity never before were required. The last chapter was called in 1816.

LEND \$5 ON \$100 BILL.
Stewardship Accommodated a Stranger and Is Arrested.

Robert Halley, a steward on the steamship Minnesota, last night was walking along Fourteenth street when a stranger told him he had to have some small money and had only a \$100 bill. He asked the steward if he would advance him \$5 and keep the bill until he could come to the boat the next day and get the rest of the money. Halley did as requested. Halley, wishing to purchase some jewelry, entered the store of Louis Arisohn, No. 6 West Fourteenth street. The jeweller looked at the bill, saw it was bogus, and had Halley arrested.

FOUND LURKING IN AREA.
Two Young Men Captured and Held as Suspicious Characters.

Policeman Thomas Fleming of the Lenox avenue station saw a man lurking in the vicinity of Maurice Schindler's tailor shop, No. 10 West One Hundred

and Twenty-sixth street, early to-day, and when he started toward him the man ran.

His suspicions aroused, Fleming began a search of the basement airways and says he found two youths under the eaves of the tailor shop. They gave names of Jeremiah Murphy, twenty, of No. 106 Lexington avenue, and Frank Forlana, nineteen, No. 228 First avenue. Fleming had to draw his revolver to force them to surrender, and says he found a "Jimmy" on Murphy.

They were looked up as suspicious persons and their finger prints will be compared at Headquarters to-day to see if they have an acquaintance downtown.

HELD FOR PICNIC MURDER.

Police Declare Solimini Confessed Snatching Cotter in Back.
Charles M. Solimini, twenty-four years old, of No. 828 Kent avenue, Brooklyn, was arraigned to-day before Magistrate Leach in Long Island City charged by Capt. Graham of the Queens Detective Bureau with participation in the murder of Leo Cotter. He was remanded for further examination.

Capt. Graham said Solimini had admitted that he had plunged a knife into Cotter's back. Cotter was found dying in a lot late Saturday night. He had been shot and stabbed after being seen at a picnic in Clinton Park, Masspeh, Arthur Hart, twenty-four years old, of No. 373 Jay street, Brooklyn, was remanded as a suspicious person on Capt. Graham's charge.


