

### RAILROAD EMPLOYEES ARE LOSING PATIENCE WITH MEDIATORS

Complete Surrender Their Demand and They Urge a Final Answer.

So far as progress is concerned the situation between the forty-five railroads West of the Mississippi River and North of the Ohio and their 100,000 employees who want increased wages stands today just where it stood a week ago. There is only this difference: that where at one time men were in hopeful humor, they are rapidly losing patience and are much nearer the point where only a strike will appease them, than they were when the Federal Board of Mediation and Conciliation pushed here from Washington, presumably to close matters up in a hurry and pave the way for arbitration.

President A. B. Garretson of the Order of Railroad Conductors and President William G. Lee of the Brotherhood of Railroad Firemen with five representatives of each body met today at the Hotel Manhattan with the mediation judges William Lea Chambers, Judge Martin A. Knapp and G. W. W. Hauger. It was a disgruntled body which ascended to the conference room on the twelfth floor. Up to date the railroads have persisted in their demands that some of their grievances be arbitrated at this time, though it is reported that they have abandoned some of the eight questions which they first presented. However, the men have delivered the ultimatum that they will enter into no arbitration that includes a single grievance of the roads since the regular thirty days' notice of such arbitration was given, and they cannot see the use of further conferences. Complete surrender or nothing is their demand, and they are not in the humor to wait much longer for their final answer.

### PERSONAL SIDE OF WASHINGTON

Vardaman of Mississippi Thinks New York Unfit for White Clothes for Men—Diplomatic Corps Forsake Washington—Jim Ham Lewis Finds Job Not All Play.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—"I understand," remarked Senator Vardaman of Mississippi, "that over in New York you are trying to popularize the wearing of white clothes by men. I have made it a practice to wear white flannels throughout the summer ever since I acquired the habit in Cuba during the Spanish war days. White clothes may not be any cooler than black clothes, but they have the effect of making me think I am cooler and that's all a man wants in any way. There is a difficulty about keeping white clothes clean and unwrinkled. I have found that there is only one rule to follow to obviate this. When you are wearing white, your conduct must be as immaculate as your clothes and you have to walk in a perfectly straight and narrow path of righteousness. I fear New Yorkers will never be able to adopt the style. Broadway is too crooked a street. A suit of white would be spotted and wrinkled before Forty-second street was reached. I think you fellows over there will have to stick to stripes and checks."

Out of the forty nations having diplomatic representatives accredited to Washington, only one ambassador and eight ministers are on duty today at the capital. All the rest have fled to summer resorts to avoid the heat of mid-summer. Viscount Chinda of Japan is the lone ambassador. Dr. Paul Ritter, Minister from Switzerland, is the only European diplomat of rank now here. Even the Mexican minister is absent. Only the Central American states have their ministers on the job, seven of them still remaining in town on account of the new broomstick diplomacy.

"This job of being Senator is nothing but work," said James Hamilton Lewis of Illinois. "I have had to employ three extra secretaries and pay them out of my own pocket just to answer letters from office seekers. Apparently every Democrat in the State of Washington where I formerly lived, and in Illinois which I now represent, thinks I must carry on personal correspondence with him and devote my entire time to get-

ting him an office. It is a case of working all day for the government and working all night for your constituents."

Colin H. Livingston, a Washington banker who is president of the Boy Scouts of America, presented to President Wilson a collection of enlarged snap shot photographs showing boy scouts engaged in a variety of outdoor activities. "This is to show you in a very limited way what the four hundred thousand boy scouts are doing in this country," Mr. Livingston said as he handed over the volume. The President, as honorary commander in chief of the scouts, was delighted with the pictures and will keep them in the White House to show foreign visitors how young America is training "to be prepared."

### RIOTING IN MINE STRIKE CALL FOR STATE TROOPS

Governor of Michigan Asked for Aid at Copper Workings, Holds Militia in Readiness.

CALUMET, Mich., July 24.—Strike violence occasioned by yesterday's walkout of copper miners in this district grew beyond the control of Sheriff Crane today and he wired to Gov. Ferris, asking that State troops be despatched to maintain order. The local militia companies were ordered to hold themselves in readiness for service pending word from the Governor who, it is understood, is on his way to Alpena from Lansing.

Mining Capt. Thomas Matthews of the Calumet and Hecla was attacked by strikers last night and knocked unconscious. A large body of strikers went from one shaft to another at the Calumet and Hecla and Tamarack and several men were injured. Hecla men were loyal employees were attacked with

stones and injured. To-day strikers gathered about the shafts to keep the men with dinner pails away. A large number of deputies have been sworn in, but are not able to keep the rioting strikers in check.

Stamp mills as well as mines are now shut down in the Lake Superior copper district because of the miners' strike. The tie-up is complete with the exception of the smelters, some of which have enough mineral on hand to operate for a week or more. It is understood the companies will make no effort now to reopen the mines.

BAY CITY, Mich., July 24.—Gov. Ferris on his way to Alpena, but delayed here by a train wreck, said today that he would not grant Sheriff Crane's request for troops at the copper mine strike district except as a last resort to protect lives. He said he believed the Sheriff's message was "anticipatory."

**Driver Injured in Fall.**  
Michael Smith, a driver, of No. 34 Nicholas avenue, Brooklyn, driving a truck for the Sage Foundation of Forest Hill, fell from the driver's seat to the sidewalk, fracturing his skull. He was taken to St. Mary's Hospital.

### "RED FLEET" RAIDS BRITAIN'S EAST COAST

Representing Germans in War Game, It Shatters Belief That Isles Are Invulnerable.

LONDON, July 24.—Germany, represented by the "Red fleet" in the annual manoeuvres of the British navy now in progress in British waters, raided the East Coast of Great Britain this morning and landed troops in the neighborhood of the Humber. After the war-ship escorting the convoy had engaged and defeated the defending fleet, four transports laden with soldiers ran the blockade which had been established and upset the cherished belief of the British Admiralty that the British Isles were invulnerable.

Vice-Admiral Sir John B. Jellicoe commanded the fleet representing the enemy which made the successful descent on the coast. The towns of Grimsby, Cleethorpes and Immingham

were occupied by the enemy who routed the territorial forces.

More mystery than ever surrounded the plans of this year's manoeuvres. It was known that one force was to try and make a landing on the East Coast, such as Germany would be expected to

attempt should war occur between the two countries, and that another force, with the assistance of the volunteer army, was to prevent it if possible, but all the details were hidden from the public. Invitations to the press were restricted and naval attaches were barred.
