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## MURPHY WITH HIS BAGMEN GOT THE CAMPAIGN CASH, IS THE CHARGE OF SULZER

**Governor Hits Back on Accusation That He Profited by Election Contributions.**

**BIG PLOT TO RUIN HIM.**

He Checks of Various "Frame Ups" by Tammany Chief and Says All Will Fail.

ALBANY, July 30.—While the Frawley Legislative Committee was probing into Gov. Sulzer's campaign contributions today, the Governor issued a statement denying certain published statements concerning the campaign fund and charging Charles F. Murphy, Tammany leader, with being the "head and front" of a conspiracy to bring about the Executive's impeachment.

The Governor says he has been informed that there was more money contributed to his campaign through Mr. Murphy than for any other candidate for Governor in twenty years and he asks Murphy "to explain the difference between what he accounted for through the State Committee and what he received through the bagmen."

The Governor declares that "if twenty-five determined and public-spirited citizens will come to his support in the battle for honesty and to bring the grafters to justice will be won and the result achieved in the end will be the greatest victory for good government in our State secured in a quarter of a century."

The Executive in his statement says his attention has been called to published reports to the effect that Jacob H. Schiff "contributed \$2,500 to my campaign fund; that I had \$25,000 in my credit in the bank before I was nominated for Governor and \$100,000 in the bank after I was elected."

The Governor says he did not know that Mr. Schiff had "sent a check to a friend for \$2,500" until he was threatened about it last May. "The Frawley Committee should produce this check," says the statement. "It was not sent to me or made to my order, and the man who got it will tell all about it at the proper time."

The check referred to was produced at the Frawley hearing to-day, as was another for \$500 contributed by Abram L. Sikus.

The Governor says that yesterday afternoon "Mr. Frawley, acting for his master, Mr. Murphy," sent for a newspaper correspondent. "It was agreed," says the Governor, "that the stories should appear in just a few newspapers published in New York City. Mr. Frawley told this newspaper man that Murphy had collected this data; that his committee would use it against me; that Murphy intended to have me indicted on these charges and then impeached. These facts will all come out. I will see to it that they do come out."

When shown the Governor's statement Chairman Frawley characterized the reference of his "secret conference" with the correspondent as "a lie."

The Executive declares that during the campaign he was "very busy making speeches" and "hence, knew little about campaign contributions or what was being done by friends in New York City."

"After election," the statement continues, "I was informed that men in my office returned some contributions, and others were used for legitimate purposes. My official statement was made up by these men. I was told it was as accurate as it could be made. I signed it. I knew little about the facts except as I was informed. I took the word of others in whom I had implicit confidence. I was too busy during the campaign to attend to these details. Others did it for me and I relied on them."

"After I became Governor I heard, now an often, something about these campaign contributions. Several people told me they contributed. I knew nothing about it. Most of the contributions made to my friends in New York City were small contributions. I spent some of my own money."

## JEWEL THIEVES GOT \$277,000 IN THREE BIG HAULS

Mrs. C. C. Rumsey Lost \$125,000 and Mrs. J. H. Hanan Missed \$150,000 in Gems.

**SERVANTS SUSPECTED.**

Detective Says Temptation Was Thrown in Way of Employees and Gives Warning.

Late reports from Narragansett Pier place the value of the gems stolen from Mrs. C. C. Rumsey, daughter of the late E. H. Harriman, on Saturday night or Sunday at \$125,000 and the loss of Mrs. John H. Hanan of New York, wife of the shoe manufacturer, who was robbed Friday night, at \$150,000. The full extent of the Rumsey robbery was not known until today, when private detectives made a thorough inventory of Mrs. Rumsey's jewelry and discovered that a second string of pearls worth \$40,000 and several other articles were missing.

Among the new articles which were found missing from the Rumsey cottage is an original Greek coin with the head of Alexander the Great the value of which cannot be estimated in terms of money.

The complete list of the jewels taken from the Rumsey cottage in Mrs. Rumsey's boudoir was made public to-day. It is as follows:

One string containing about 148 pearls graduated in size with three large ones in the center. Whiteish in color, approximated value \$16,000.

One string containing about 218 pearls graduated in size from very small to ordinary size. Approximated value about \$40,000.

One large ruby set in bar of diamonds, weight of ruby about five karats, valued at \$5,000.

One round diamond "artier pin, diamond weighing about four carats, value \$1,000.

A gold mesh bag with plain clasp. Inside of the bag was a small platinum and gold purse containing a Greek coin (original) with head of Alexander the Great, an almost priceless relic.

A gold fountain pen, gold pencil, vanity box of purple and leather and three \$5 gold pieces.

The principal articles taken from Mrs. Hanan were:

A diamond necklace.

A pearl necklace.

A diamond encrusted watch.

A set of star sapphires surrounded by diamonds.

A diamond pendant.

A diamond brooch.

A pair of diamond earrings.

A pair of black diamond earrings surrounded by white diamonds.

A platinum watch set with diamonds.

## GUNMEN SHOOT JEWELLER IN SHOP, DEFY BIG CROWD

Two Bullets Answer Refusal to Buy "Little Archie" Gang's Benefit Tickets.

## BANDITS UNHINDERED.

Trio's Flourished Weapons Overawe East Side Throng That Watches Flight.

Three gunmen, desperate in their attempts to raise money for the defense of some of their pals now in the Tombs awaiting trial for murder, invaded the jewelry store of David Finver at No. 94 Clinton street this afternoon, demanded a contribution from Finver and, when he refused, shot him twice.

The gunmen ran out on Clinton street, one of the busiest and most crowded of the whole east side, sped unhindered to Rivington street and there disappeared. Finver is in Gouverneur Hospital, believed to be dying.

**ORDERED TO BUY "LITTLE ARCHIE" GANG TICKETS.**

Finver was alone in his shop when the three entered. All of them were young men whom he thought he recognized, having seen them frequently in the hangout of the "Little Archie" gang on lower Rivington street.

The tallest of the trio stepped up to Finver and said:

"We are selling tickets for a raffie to raise money for some of the boys who are in trouble. We want you to buy a chance."

"You ——— If you don't come through we'll clean up your place!" one of the three yelled, drawing an automatic pistol from his pocket. Finver jumped to the front of his showcase, where, in a drawer, he keeps a loaded revolver; but before he could get the weapon the gunmen began shooting.

The jeweller fell with one bullet through his left shoulder and another through the front of his breast, over the heart. The three assailants then turned and fled, waving their revolvers and firing them over the pedestrians on the sidewalk.

Meyer Brownwitz of No. 125 Goerck street, a street sweeper, was standing directly in front of Finver's shop when the shooting occurred. He tried to throw himself in the way of the three men when they passed him, but one bowled him over with a swing to the jaw.

The gunmen turned into Rivington street, the crowd on the sidewalk parting like a wave in their path. When Policemen Daly and Lockhart of the Clinton street station came running to the store they found Finver lying beneath the showcase half conscious.

By the apparently dying man's side was found a revolver with one exploded shell in its chamber and the ejected shell of an automatic weapon.
