

WIFE GIVES GRAVE TO SUICIDE ELOPER AND GIRL HE SLEW

Forgives Elliott and Pretty Cousin Who Joined Him in Their Death Compact.

SHE WORKED FOR BOTH.

Suffered Humiliation Till the Situation Was Too Apparent to Be Ignored.

The wife of Harry G. Elliott, who shot and killed Ellen Sidley and committed suicide in McDermott's Den last Saturday night, took charge of the bodies to-day in Fordham morgue and will see that they are given decent burial. The Sidley girl was Mrs. Elliott's cousin. "He was a wild, irresponsible man," said the widow. "He treated me cruelly and he deceived this unsuspecting young woman and both of them died because of it. I can't see them buried in Pottery Field, where had a couple of hundred dollars saved up but he had spent it all before they reached the end of their sinning."

Elliott was about fifty years old and an Englishman. He was married nine years ago. His wife didn't know much about him but she was in love with him and willingly supported him in his idleness, working as a servant or a landlady.

Six months ago the Elliotts took Ellen Sidley, fresh from Killarney, young and pretty into their home, at No. 303 Third avenue. While the wife was away at work, Elliott had plenty of time to cultivate the acquaintance of her cousin.

"He had a way with women," said one of Mrs. Elliott's relatives to-day. "The wife suffered the humiliation of what she could not fail to see until three months ago, when she discovered that Ellen Sidley was in a delicate condition. She closed the Third avenue home, and went to work as a servant for Dr. Nathan Breiter, at No. 1 West Ninety-third street. Elliott took a room with Catherine Porter, a friend of his wife, at No. 20 West One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, and Ellen Sidley found a place as a servant and turned her earnings over to Elliott. He invested some of her savings in a small diamond ring and a wedding ring.

On July 1, Elliott stole \$17 from Miss Porter and decamped. A few days later he appeared in the neighborhood with Ellen Sidley, and the pair took a room at No. 20 West One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, in the flat of Mr. and Mrs. M. O'Dea. Mrs. O'Dea had known Ellen Sidley in Killarney. She posed as the wife of Elliott, who kept out of sight in the evenings when Miss Porter was at her home across the street, but circulated around the neighborhood freely in the daytime while Miss Porter was at work.

THREATENED TO KILL WIFE FOR "INTERFERENCE."

Elliott's wife located him Saturday afternoon. In company with a woman relative she called at the O'Dea home and asked for Elliott. She was told that Elliott and his wife had a room in the flat.

"I'm his wife," said Mrs. Elliott, forcing her way in and rushing through the house, looking for her husband.

Elliott met her at the door of his room. He had a pistol in his hand and warned her that if she interfered any further in his "personal business" he would kill her. She knew him well enough to believe he would shoot her and beat a retreat. Later she went to the West One Hundred fifty-second street station, where she was told to apply for a warrant in a Magistrate's court.

Elliott went out after the visit of his wife and tried in vain to get his effects from Miss Porter. The Sidley girl broke down and told the whole story of her infatuation for her cousin's

husband. She said she had decided to kill herself, but would rather have Elliott kill her and commit suicide. The pair left the O'Dea home Saturday evening. Elliott had been drinking and was morose and maudlin. The girl appeared to be on the verge of collapse.

GIRL WROTE NOTE TELLING OF DEATH COMPACT.

It has been learned since that they had made their death pact, and that the girl had already written a note which was found pinned to Elliott's coat when the bodies were discovered to-day. The note read:

Aug. 2.
To Whom It May Concern:
This is to certify that we have agreed to die together. We have sinned, but we loved each other. Rooner than part we die together. Our wish is that our bodies be not separated in death.

Mrs. Elliott was informed of the end of her husband and her cousin late last night by a relative. She became hysterical and Dr. Breiter and his wife spent most of the night taking care of her. Early to-day she visited one of the priests at the Holy Name Church, Ninety-sixth street and Amsterdam avenue. When she returned to the Breiter home she was calm and resigned and announced that she had decided to obey the last wish of the two who had brought into her life so much sorrow and tragedy.

WIDOW AND PET DOGS DIE BY GAS POISONING

Two pet dogs, her only companions since the death of her husband three or four months ago, died with Mrs. Marie Carvello, fifty-five years old, when she killed herself by asphyxiation in her little apartment at No. 213 Oakland street, Brooklyn, last night. The body of the woman and the two dead dogs were found this morning.

Neighbors smelled gas and traced the odor to Mrs. Carvello's apartment. They then summoned her brother-in-law, Michael Carvello, who lives in the neighborhood. He broke into the apartment and found her lying on a bed and the dogs stretched on the floor beside the bed.

Dr. Felner was called from Williamsburgh Hospital and said Mrs. Carvello had been dead about two hours. A gas jet was wide open and all doors and windows of the apartment were tightly closed. Michael Carvello was certain it was a case of suicide.
