CAMPAIGN CHECK CASHED AS SULZER BOUGHT STOCKS

Legislators, in Trying to Connect the Transactions, Find More Unwilling Witnesses.

DOELGER GAVE A CHECK.

It Was Marked "No Receipt Necessary" and Was Not Reported by Sulzer.

The Joint Legislative Committee which is seeking on behalf of the Democratic State organization to discredit Gov. William Sulzer and his administration, with intent to bring about his removal from office, met again to-day in the Council Chamber of the City Hall. In irrelevant and cheerful moments members of the committee call themselves the "Committee to Put the Doe on Bill."

The net result of their efforts to-day was to prove that F. A. Colwell, a former broker, who yesterday refused to answer questions regarding his relations in a business way with Gov. Sulzer, bought 100 shares of Big Four stock from Boyer, Griswold & Co. at about the time that Boyer, Griswold & Co. cashed a check to Gov. Sulzer given by John Lynn as a campaign contribution. The check was certified, and Colwell's name did not appear on it.

CONTRIBUTION FROM DOELGER WAS NOT REPORTED. It was also shown to-day that Peter Doelger, a brewer, made a contribution of \$500 to Gov. Sulzer's campaign fund through Charles A. Stadler of the American Malt Company. This was not mentioned in Mr. Sulzer's sworn statement of his receipts of campaign contributions. With the check was a letter from Mr. Stadler, acknowledging it on behalf of Sulzer and a receipt reading: "Campaign contribution, check mailed to Mr. Stadler, New York, N. Y."

Charles Gottlieb of the American Flax Company admitted having received a letter of Gov. Sulzer recently which he thought he had destroyed. He denied having told former Police Lieutenant Val O'Farrell, detective for the committee, that the letter was injurious to the Governor and that he was going to



BASEBALL POOL LOTTERY RECEIVES ITS FIRST JOLT

Under arrest, charged with conducting a lottery, upon evidence gathered by Evening World reporters, Henry Francis Toren, operator of one of the largest baseball pools that have sprung up in New York, to-day appeared for a hearing in the Tombs Court. Toren was arrested late yesterday, and after spending several hours in the Tombs finally accepted bail and was released in Night Court. Magistrate Barlow to-day granted an adjournment of one week.

At the time of his arrest and again to-day Toren tacitly conceded his guilt, but expressed a willingness to help expose others who are conducting these alleged pools in New York. He is known to have in his possession evidence that will break up many another "sure thing" form of gambling can be effectually squelched.

At the conclusion of their talk the statement was published that Mr. Mitchel is in the fight to the finish and will not step aside to make way for anybody.

31 TANKS EXPLODE AS BIG OIL BLAZE WIPES OUT BLOCK

Firemen, Overcome, Fight Flames That Threaten Wide Section in Philadelphia. PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 7.—The plant of the Union Petroleum Company, a Standard Oil subsidiary, in the southeastern section of this city, caught fire this afternoon and promised to be a total loss. It occupied an entire city block. An explosion of an oil tank started the fire which quickly spread, and thirty-one big oil tanks in all exploded.
