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DWYER HELD IN \$1,000, 5 POLICEMEN PAROLED, FOR HEALY OUTRAGES

Magistrate Deuel Relents Something of His Severity, But Refuses to Delay Trial of Offenders Beyond Saturday Morning.

WHITMAN'S SHARP RETORT TO GAYNOR'S CRITICISM

Personal Liberty Issue Raised Now and Many Angry Citizens Call for Mass Meetings of Protest.

Inspector John F. Dwyer was arrested to-day, arraigned before Magistrate Deuel in the West Side Court, and held in \$1,000 bail for examination at 10.30 o'clock on Saturday morning on two charges, one of felonious assault, brought by George F. Flannery, a newspaper man, and one of simple assault brought by Albert Grau, a theatrical manager, both offenses occurring early this morning at Healy's restaurant, Columbus avenue and Sixty-sixth street, when Dwyer led a squad of policemen into the place and ejected bodily the men and women dining there.

District-Attorney Whitman late this afternoon gave out a reply to Mayor Gaynor's statement, made earlier in the day, in which he declares the law has been grossly violated and that the courts repeatedly have ruled on the points involved.

With Dwyer were arraigned five of his policemen and, contrary to his promise that he would extend no leniency to them, the Magistrate was persuaded to parole these men until Saturday morning. Between now and Saturday morning the other eight policemen from whom warrants have been issued will be arraigned, though it is likely that Warrant Officer Randolph will be unable to find them until Saturday morning so that none is likely to spend any time in a cell. Magistrate Deuel set Saturday for the hearing because to-morrow is the day off of several of the policemen.

The policemen besides Dwyer who were arrested are John A. Hyer, Patrick Walsh, John T. Hoffman, John Sheridan and Nelson Merrill. Each is charged simply with assault. All were arrested at the West Sixty-sixth street station except Dwyer, who was in court with Assistant Corporation Counsel George M. Curtis. When Randolph appeared with his prisoners Curtis was wrangling with Magistrate Deuel over his request to have the cases transferred to another court.

"In view of the way in which you have been quoted in the newspapers," said Mr. Curtis, "making it appear that you had passed judgment on these cases already, we thought perhaps you might want to transfer them."

"What's that?" exclaimed the Magistrate angrily. "do you mean to intimate that I cannot try these cases fairly and on their merits. If you are ready to proceed, you may do so, if you are not, let the policemen waive examination to-day and I will hold them in bail till to-morrow afternoon if you wish. I will not transfer the cases, if Inspector Dwyer wants an adjournment he can have it till to-morrow and I will hold him in \$1,000 bail."

"You don't mean to say that you won't parole these men in my custody, do you?" Mr. Curtis demanded.

"That's exactly what I mean," said Magistrate Deuel, firmly. "I will not"

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SULZER ALARMED BY WIFE'S ILLNESS, GETS NEW DOCTORS

Jacobi and McDonald Summoned to Albany to Consult With Abrahams.

(Special to The Evening World.) ALBANY, Aug. 14.—Mrs. Sulzer is very ill. Besides Dr. R. Abrahams of New York, a specialist in nervous disorders who was summoned yesterday to attend her, Gov. Sulzer has sent for Dr. Jacobi and Dr. McDonald of New York. The Governor is greatly concerned about the condition of his wife and slept little last night between attention to her and conferences with counsel.

Mrs. Sulzer has collapsed under the strain of the situation and the Governor admits that she is suffering from a complete nervous breakdown. Dr. Abrahams issued the following statement this afternoon:

Mrs. Sulzer's condition is serious just at present. I hope, however, that she will rally before I leave her. She is restless and feverish. Her temperature is 102 and pulse 128. Her condition demands absolute rest. I ordered the nurse who is in charge not to permit anybody to see Mrs. Sulzer except further notice. Friends are requested not to call.

ROBERT ABRAHAM. Until Mrs. Sulzer recovers her health and spirits her story will be kept from the public. But the Governor's friends intimate that if she takes the stand and tells her complete story there will be nothing left of the impeachment proceedings.

Her illness has affected the Governor deeply. When he learned the serious nature of her ailment last night he declared, in an outburst of impetuosity, that he would never permit her to take the witness stand at his trial.

GLYNN GIVES NOTICE SULZER MUST GET OUT TO-MORROW MORNING

Acting Governor Late This Afternoon Decides to Take Action to Establish His Authority as the State Executive.

(Special to The Evening World.) ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 14.—Acting Governor Glynn announced late this afternoon that he had decided to take steps to establish his rights and powers as Governor of the State of New York.

In a long consultation with former Judge Countryman and P. C. Dugan, an Albany lawyer, he decided on a course of action.

He will try to oust Gov. Sulzer to-morrow morning, but will not reveal his plan.

One of the first developments of the day was the posting to Acting Governor Glynn of control of the National Guard. Adjutant-General Henry D. Hamilton, through his chief of staff Col. Howard, formally acknowledged the authority of the Acting Governor. General Hamilton is a Sulzer appointee, but a Tammany Hall Democrat. His home is in New York and he went there to-day.

The move of Gen. Hamilton means that if Gov. Sulzer should attempt to call out the National Guard for any reason he would be ignored by the officers at headquarters.

Late this afternoon Mr. Glynn received word from Mitchell May, Secretary of State, that when the time is ripe he will personally recognize Glynn as the de facto Governor of the State and will give him access to the great seal of the State. He also sent word that he will refuse use of the seal to Gov. Sulzer.

SITUATION TANGLED BY ACTS OF RIVALRY. The tangled situation was brought about to-day when Gov. Sulzer, heedless of the action of the Legislature in impeaching him, took possession of his office and continued to exercise his functions as Governor of the State, and Martin H. Glynn, Lieutenant-Governor, began to exercise the power and privileges of Acting Governor. Gov. Sulzer is holding the fort in the Executive Chamber with the staff of executive clerks, while Acting Governor Glynn is governing from the office of the Lieutenant-Governor on the third floor, using his own staff of clerks.

The Acting Governor has all the better of the situation as it applies to State departments. First and foremost he has behind him the Comptroller, who handles the cash, and cash is a big factor. Deputy Comptroller Walsh, who is in charge of the office during the absence because of illness of Comptroller Sohmer, does not recognize the authority of Gov. Sulzer to authorize the expenditure of any State moneys.

Backing up Acting-Governor Glynn are the Legislature, the Comptroller, the State Engineer and Surveyor, the State Excise Commissioner, a majority of the Conservation Commission, the Board of Agriculture, the State Fair Commission, the Canal Board, the State Commission of Prisons, the Fiscal Supervisor, the Board of Charities, the Board of Efficiency and Economy, the Board of Claims, the State Superintendent of Elections, the Fire Marshal, the Public Service Commission and the Board of Trustees of Public Buildings.

The Public Service Commission of the Second District is under the control of Governor Sulzer. The Labor Department is not allied with one side or the other, there being no official head of that bureau at this time. The State Superintendent of Insurance, Richard
