City-Wide Series of Better Babies' Contests**

**Final Judging Day at Little Mothers' Aid;
Eleven Kiddies Have Scored 99 Per Cent.**

Will baby win a prize?
That's the question being asked to-day in a hundred homes within the contest district of the Little Mothers' Aid Association at No. 236 Second avenue.

This is "anxious day" for 100 of the 400 mothers who entered their little ones for championship titles and Evening World money prizes in the big contest at this centre. The race began early in July and the last entrant had his name subscribed as a starter on Aug. 12. The competition district extended from Seventh to Twenty-eighth street and from Fifth avenue to the East River—a locality that embraces all nationalities. Daily during the month of registration happy mothers and fathers, proud grandmas and grandpas and scores of "little" mothers and "big" brothers tramped into headquarters with prospective prizewinners until 60 of the latter were ready for the race.

Ever since the committee of physicians judges from the New York Department of Health have been critically examining the tots, testing and

measuring them according to a standard score card. And as a result the doctors and the officers of the Little Mothers' Aid are enthusiastic. The kiddies have made a wonderful showing. Of the 400 entrants 99 scored over 95 per cent. No less than 11 youngsters scored 99 per cent., just one point under perfection.

And, of course, this kind of close racing means that the judges have to consider the smallest details of excellence or imperfection in making their awards. To-day they meet for their

final re-examination of all the high-score babies. Four will be adjudged prize winners; the remaining 84 young citizens will be awarded honorable mention certificates. But none except the judges will know who the lucky title winners are until next Monday afternoon, when at 1 o'clock the public announcements will be made. That's why to-day is "anxious day" at the Little Mothers' Aid. Meantime preparations are going merrily on for judging the 885 kiddies who are in the race at Greenwich House, No. 28 Jones street. Committees of doctors are being organized and it is expected that by Sept. 15 the work of examining the little ones will begin. On the same date judging will begin for the contest at Little Italy House, No. 146 Union street, Brooklyn.
