

### FIGHTS TO RETAIN CUSTODY OF CHILD TO SAVE ITS LIFE

"Little Boy's Neck Broken in Two Places," Says Doctor-Father; "Needs My Care."

Dr. John Husson of the visiting staff of Hahnemann Hospital made a strange plea today in Justice Delany's part of the Supreme Court for the custody of his four-year-old son, John Jr.

Since the child was eighteen months old he has lived with a broken neck—broken in two places, the second dorsal vertebra and the seventh cervical vertebra—injuries which surgeons say ordinarily would have caused instant death. Now the child romps with other children, and there is not the least trace of the injury. Both the father and mother want him.

In an affidavit which the physician submitted in court in a separation suit brought by his wife, Jennie, he says

that unless the boy is given into his care the child will not live and, as the doctor put it, "only delicate and interested treatment will preserve his life."

"When John was eighteen months old," the father told the Evening World reporter, "he fell a distance of fourteen feet from a fire escape and broke his neck in two places. For forty-eight hours he hovered between life and death. While in this condition he appeared to be dead and the rigid test of puncturing his skin with a needle was necessary to tell whether life had become extinct. At the end of five days I put him in a halter and in a few months he was well. He never left my side throughout the treatment."

X-ray photographs which the father exhibited to the reporter in his office at No. 100 West One Hundred and second street, showed two clean breaks in the spinal column where the vertebrae had been crushed.

The marital troubles of the Hussons have been manifold. They were first aired in the local courts when Mrs. Husson brought suit in July against Mrs. Louise Hiddell Park, a wealthy patient of the doctor, for \$5,000 damages, alleging that Mrs. Park alienated the affections of her husband.

The separation suit was brought early in August, the wife charging that when her husband first met Mrs. Park in a professional way he became infatuated with her and declared that he intended

to "spend the remainder of his days with Mrs. Park." This charge the husband vigorously denies in a contesting affidavit.

The matter came up before Justice Delany on a motion made by the wife's attorney, Abraham Silberberg, for \$5 a week permanent alimony. She swore in an affidavit that her husband was pretty well to do and had an income from his practice of \$5,000 a year and that he wants to pay her only \$10 a week.

In addition to these accusations Mrs. Husson declared that her husband assaulted and struck her on Aug. 24 and told her that it "was only a light slap of what he proposed to give to her if she did not leave his household."

Replying to this charge of cruel treatment Dr. Husson deposes in his affidavit that "he merely endeavored to subdue her without resorting to any violence, when she had a fit of jealousy and rage against me." Mrs. Husson's attorney in court said that Dr. L. Husson had admitted the assault, but said he acted in self defense. Mrs. Husson is twenty years younger than her husband, who is fifty-two.

**WIFE DROVE PATIENTS AWAY, HE SWEARS.**

Among other charges which the husband enumerates in his affidavit is that his wife was in the habit of calling at his office while he was treating patients and looking through the key hole. As a result of this and other practices, the physician alleges, his practice, which was formerly very

lucrative, has dwindled away. Nervousness says the physician, is the cause of his wife's fit-temper and jealousy.

Regarding the alienation of affections suit filed by Mrs. Husson against Mrs. Park, the former says in her affidavit that the filing of it "worked like a bombshell," and ever since then she has been subjected to a series of explosions of anger and wrath at her husband's hands.

The doctor admitted something like a bombshell explosion when he heard that Mrs. Park, while under his care in the Hahnemann Hospital, had been served with papers on her sick bed. Justice Delany has not made up his mind as to whether he will grant the wife her plea for increased alimony.
