

The Evening World's and Welfare Association's City-Wide Series of Better Babies' Contests Judging Babies of Brooklyn Begins Next Monday; Surprises Are Promised

**Little Italy House Section,
It Is Said, Will Show
Some Astonishing Scores**
—Letter of Appreciation
From the Parents of a
Prize Winner in One of
the Manhattan Contests.

And now make way for their majesties, the Babies of Brooklyn! Their day begins next Monday. Manhattan, through the big contest at the Little Mothers' Aid, has been attracting much attention for the last two weeks to its champion kiddies, while Brooklyn just had to wait until the committee of judges was ready to examine its chubby youngsters. And Monday the work of the judges begins at Little Italy House, No. 146 Union street. From 1 to 5 each afternoon throughout the week physicians and nurses will test and measure and examine the young entrants according to the standard score card of physical perfection.

"We have no hesitation in saying," declared Dr. James Robbins to-day, "that our section of Brooklyn will produce the equal if not the superior of any infant yet entered in any of the contests. We have more than a few surprises for mighty Manhattan."

The following Monday judging will begin at Greenwich House, No. 25 Jones street. No less than 100 kiddies are in that room, and the judging will no doubt continue for ten days at least.

DIET CARD FOR CHILDREN FROM 15TH TO 24TH MONTH.

To-day at this centre the second diet card was distributed to mothers. It is for children from eighteen months to two years of age, and reads as follows:

Breakfast—Juice of one sweet orange or pulp of six stewed prunes or pineapple juice (fresh or bottled) one ounce. A cereal such as cream of wheat, oatmeal, farina or hominy prepared with pop milk (top also-cream) or milk, or milk and butter. (Note.—If concentrated give the fruit one-half hour before breakfast with water; if not, they may be given during the forenoon. Raw fruit juice must be given either one-half hour before or one-half hour after milk.)

Forenoon—A glass of milk with two teaspoons macaroni or spaghetti or Graham crackers.

Dinner—Broth or soup made of beef, mutton or chicken, and thickened with peas, farina, eggs or rice, or beef juice with white bread crumbs, or clear vegetable soup with yolk of egg or soft-boiled, with bread, crumbs, or the egg, poached, with a glass of milk. Dessert: Apple sauce, prune pulp, with stale lady fingers, or Graham wafers or plain pudding—rice, bread, tapioca, blanc-mange, junket or baked custard.

Supper—Glass of milk warm or cold; spaghetti and custard or stewed fruit.

Total milk in twenty-four hours, one and a half quarts.

Deputy Commissioner Newburger was present to see that "The Lure" presented before the Grand Jury was the same play he had seen and reported upon last week, and not a hastily pruned and deodorized version, doctored up to "get by" the Grand Jurors.

ISLANDS SINK IN OCEAN; HUNDREDS OF NATIVES HAVE ALSO VANISHED

Falcon and Hope, of Friendly Group in Pacific, Probably Wiped Out by Earthquake

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 12.—Falcon and Hope islands, of the Friendly or Tonga group in the South Pacific, have disappeared from view. With them several hundred natives and a few white men also have vanished. News to this effect was brought to San Francisco yesterday by Capt. J. H. Trask of the steamer Sonoma, which arrived from Sydney via Pago Pago and Honolulu. Capt. Trask said: "One of the regular trading steamers between Sydney and the Tonga group reported the sinking of the islands. The vessel steamed to where Falcon island should have been, but it was nowhere in sight. Just prior to this the instruments at the Sydney Naval Station showed that several violent earthquakes had taken place about two thousand miles northwest of Sydney."

TAXPAYER SUIT FOR THAW.

Former Judge Ousted Outlines Novel Line of Action.

CONCORD, N. H., Sept. 12.—Willard H. Olinsted, a New York lawyer, and former Justice of Special Sessions, arrived here to-day to take charge of the interests of Harry K. Thaw if action at the State capital may be necessary. Justice Olinsted said that if Thaw is taken back to New York a taxpayer's suit will be brought there for his deportation to Pennsylvania, on the ground that in his case New York is being taxed for the support of an insane person whose legal residence is in another State.

Kansas Has 1,045,021 Population. TOPEKA, Sept. 12.—The population of Kansas is 1,045,021, a gain of 16,333 over 1912, according to official figures announced to-day by the State Board of Agriculture. In 1912 the State lost 17,333 over the census figures of 1911.
