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300 PASSENGERS IN PANIC WHEN ALBANY NIGHT BOAT CRASHED INTO ROCKY SHORE

Mohawk Marooned for Three Hours in Dark—Women swooned on Deck and Children Were Terrified.

The Hudson River liner Mohawk, of the Manhattan Navigation Company, bound from New York to Albany with 300 passengers aboard, was run onto the rocky river shore near Hyde Park, not far from Poughkeepsie, shortly before midnight and her passengers were thrown into a panic that lasted three and a half hours.

During that frenzied period women were swooning and praying and frightened children kept up a continual wail.

At 3 o'clock this morning the Iroquois of the same line, bound down stream, was warped alongside the helpless and leaking Mohawk and the terrified passengers were taken aboard and carried to Poughkeepsie.

There they were abandoned to seek shelter in the New York Central Railroad station. Indignation ran high when the weary crowd was told by the railroad employees that no arrangements had been made for any special train, which the 300 were assured, aboard the Iroquois, would be waiting to take them on to Albany.

OSBORNE JOINS GANG OF CONVICTS IN AUBURN PRISON

Reformer Goes Among Stubborn Class of Prisoners for First Experience.

EATS THE PRISON FARE.

His Cell Is Near Quarters of "Bad Men" Transferred From Sing Sing.

(Special to The Evening World.) AUBURN, N. Y., Sept. 29.—Thomas Mott Osborne, as Chairman of the New York State Commission on Prison Reform, entered Auburn Prison to-day to serve a short term voluntarily imposed upon him by himself for the purpose of studying the effect of prison environment upon the physical and mental condition of human kind.

The prison reform commission includes Dean George Washington Kirchway of Columbia Law School, Prof. E. Stagg Whitin of Columbia University, United States Judge Charles M. Hough, George W. Perkins, Prof. Howard T. Mosher of Rochester University, Mrs. Hannah Blum, wife of Rabbi Blum, a Chaplain of the Tombs, Miss Madeline Dady, social worker; Miss Margaret Hay, daughter of the late Secretary of State, Edward Bates, and State Commissioner of Prisons John H. Riley.

HIS BRISTLING MOUSTACHE SHAVED AWAY.

His bristling moustache was first shaved away, but his hair, worn short normally, remains untouched by the prison barber. The intention to put him into the broom shop was changed, because of the dead level conditions there in the monotonous sorting of broom corn. He was put at first in the idle gang—known as "roughnecks," whose idleness in other tasks causes their being placed together for detached service.

Mr. Osborne before entering prison declared he would decline to stand for any photographs and that his experiment was sensational enough in purpose without being used for further sensationalism by publication of photographs. To make certain that no cameras would snap him when he went in, the time for his entry was not made public.
