

RESCUED CREW RELATE VAIN FIGHT TO SAVE SCHOONER

Manned Pumps in Gale on Marjorie Brown Till Hands Bled. MADE OFF IN YAWL. Their Ship Sank and Liner Picked Up Wind-Blown Mariners.

Skipper J. E. Walker and the eight men of the crew of the schooner Marjorie Brown, foundered at sea during a gale last Sunday night, came to port to-day aboard the North German Lloyd steamship Berlin, which had rescued them in distress. They had a tale to tell of looking death in the face for terrible hours on end, while they were drifting helplessly on a waterlogged craft 200 miles east of Sandy Hook.

The Marjorie Brown, a 1,000-ton schooner, of which A. J. Bailey of No. 50 Pearl street is the New York agent, was bound from Newport News, Va., for Providence, R. I., with coal, when last Sunday afternoon the wind began to freshen into a gale. By night the sou'wester had lashed itself into what sailors call a "true gale" and the Marjorie Brown was making a bad time of it.

Here is the way Capt. Brown finishes the story:

MEN WORKED PUMPS UNTIL HANDS BLEED.

"The schooner was loaded so heavily she could not rise to the seas and she labored severely and some of her seams began to open about midnight on Sunday. I put the men at the pumps—they standing up to their waists in the water that came over side with every wave. But though they worked the pumps until their hands bled the water gained on us.

"At 4 o'clock on Monday morning I saw that there was no more use trying to save the schooner, and I called the men away from the pumps. We had nothing hot to eat, for by that time the salley fire had been doused. The ship began sinking by the head. We had to retreat to the poop, and there we stayed, waiting for dawn and the chance of a passing ship."

"No ship showed at dawn, and we

were down so far by the head that I thought she would go under in another hour. Still we stuck. The shifting of the cargo with the sinking of the boat threw the poop higher in the air each moment. It began to look as if we would have to figure on getting away. LAUNCH YAWL JUST BEFORE SCHOONER SINKS.

"We had only one yawl, hanging over the stern. Near 10 o'clock I ordered the yawl launched. We couldn't stow any grub or water in her, for the whole of

the schooner except the after deck was now under water. In launching the yawl we lost one pair of oars. With only the single remaining pair we shoved off a few minutes after 10 o'clock and the Marjorie Brown went down within fifteen minutes.

"Lucky for us we were squarely in the steamer track. Monday afternoon we sighted the Berlin's smoke to the southeast and when she came up on us she caught sight of us, shifted her course and picked us up. If it hadn't

been for her we would have been drifting out there yet, for the current was taking us away from the steamer track and out into the forgotten ocean."

Capt. Harasswitz of the Berlin directed the rescue of the Marjorie Brown's shipwrecked crew. The schooner went down in latitude 40.3 North and longitude 71.32 West.
