Mr. Fowler decided that he called up District Attorney Whitman on the telephone last Saturday and tried to make an arrangement for a meeting. He said that if his friend, D. A. While Mr. Fowler did not go to the District Attorney's office today, Mr. Whitman had another caller in whom he took a great deal of interest. This was Alexander Otto of Rochester, Mr. Otto, it is understood, opened up a new line of investigation into the alleged conspiracy to shake down contractors under the guise of getting campaign contributions from them.

EX-GOVERNOR SULZER IS NAMED NOW.

Former Gov. William Sulzer's name was brought into the political controversy today, and it was reported the District Attorney had decided to permit him to testify unless he waives immunity. Soon after George H. McClellan told of handing Sulzer \$50,000 in the Hotel Onondaga, Syracuse, the day after Sulzer's resignation last week, the second governor was quoted as offering to take the stand.

What Mr. Whitman is trying to ascertain now is if Sulzer was one of the men at a Syracuse meeting when ways and means were devised for "sandbagging" contractors on State highways and bridge canal work. If Sulzer should become a witness he will be asked if he, Henry P. Burgard, George H. McClellan, William H. Kelley and Eugene J. Wood met in the Syracuse Hotel the day after Sulzer's nomination for the purpose named.

There was every assurance today that the wide conspiracy of extorting political contributions in the State would be heard. Several who have been active in the system are eager to follow Fowler and tell all they know. The "bagmen" for the six "districts" in the State are reported as eager to see the District Attorney if it is a scramble to get in on the ground floor.

It is believed that the expected confessions may result in the impication of one prominent State official and of a prominent Democratic leader, who holds no State office. In fact, it was considered not unlikely that those men might be dragged to the stand to show a depth that indictments against them would follow.

William H. Kelley wants to appear, it was said, as a witness, but as he does not want to waive immunity, he probably will not be called. Henry P. Burgard will not be called. One of the matters of the case today was why Burgard should have given John A. Hennessy \$10,000 to continue the work of investigation in the State departments.

BACK INSHOTS ONLY \$35,000 WAS RAISED.

Norman E. Mack said last night at the Knickerbocker Hotel that he was surprised to see it reported again in the papers this morning that the Democratic State Committee in 1912, the year I was Chairman, collected \$35,000 in the way of contributions for campaign purposes. In the most emphatic manner I want to say that the statement is ridiculous unless the amount contributed that year was \$35,000, and was for the purpose of the Treasurer in the report filed with the Secretary of State.

"If it were true that any such large sum had been raised in that year, or any other year, I would not blame the people for wondering what became of the money. But as only \$35,000 was raised I fail to see any reason for hysteria and false statements where the reputation and good name of honest men are involved. The amount received was so small that it was impossible to make any kind of vigorous campaign that year.

"During my connection with the State Committee I felt that I owed it to my party to conduct as vigorous a campaign as possible with the financial means at my command. It is true that I conferred with Democrats, in office and out, in Buffalo, this morning, and as a means of raising money to pay the legitimate expense of the campaign of that year, as this is the only way a State Committee has of obtaining money to pay the cost of office hire, clerical force, postage, telegrams, literature and the numerous legitimate expenses of the campaign."

BROKER TAKES WIFE TO POLICE STATION

John B. Gray Makes Charge of Attempted Blackmail, but She Is Discharged.

John B. Gray, a broker, living at No. 105 Riverside Drive, met his wife, Jacqueline E. Gray, of Pleasantville, N. Y., at a hotel today. According to Gray, she demanded that he give her \$5,000 in automobiles and some furniture, with the alternative of a scandal, which she said, would ruin him. Gray got into a tangle with her, but instead of going where she thought he would be sent to the West Thirtieth street station.

The sergeant in charge sent them and their Marjorie Nolan heard the story. The first part of it was that the Grays were married nine years ago and lived together for six years. Then Mrs. Gray went to Reno and obtained a divorce. After that she made it up again and was remarried. This went on happily until seven months ago when Mrs. Gray left for her mother's home in Pleasantville.

Magistrate Nolan then heard the blackmail charge and when he found that Gray had not witnessed substantiate his charge he dismissed Mrs. Gray.

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# HENCHMAN TURNS STATE'S EVIDENCE AGAINST SENATOR

## Bombshell Thrown in Trial of Carroll and Others for "Bossing" Primary.

### CONSPIRACY CHARGED.

### Cropsey Has Confession of Owens, Indicted After District Contest.

After a delay of nineteen months, District Attorney Cropsey of Kings County called to trial today before Justice Kelly in the Supreme Court State Senator Daniel J. Carroll, Democratic leader of the Fourteenth Assembly District; Luke O'Reilly, the Brooklyn lawyer; Thomas Owens, Thomas Bohan and Emil Mormonstein, jointly indicted on a charge of conspiracy. The indictment was found in April, 1912.

It grows out of the primary fights in March, 1912, when John McKeon tried to wrest control of the Fourteenth District from Senator Carroll. The contest in that district was extremely bitter and approached the character of a pitched battle.

As a result the defendants named above were indicted for conspiracy to control the primary election. They were also indicted for assault.

At the opening of the trial today Robert H. Elder, counsel for the defense, asked Justice Kelly to discharge the special panel that had been summoned for the trial. Mr. Elder alleged that an attempt had been made to influence the talesmen.

LAWYER ACCUSES DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE.

"Representative of the District Attorney," said Mr. Elder, "have called on me who were summoned to sit on this jury and asked them if they were Catholics or Democrats. We submit affidavits to prove this and respectfully ask that a jury be selected from the regular panel in other courts or in any manner Your Honor may see fit."

Justice Kelly decided to allow the special panel to stand. A jury was secured in the morning session and Assistant District Attorney Allen opened for the prosecution this afternoon.

Politicians of all degrees besieged the court-room, eager to hear the testimony. So great was the crowd at the opening of the afternoon session that court attendants locked the door. Then when somebody having business outside tried to get out the lock wouldn't work. It became necessary finally to get a carpenter to saw out a panel of the door in order to open it.

Mr. Allen said the indictment was based on happenings in the polling place at No. 25 North Sixth street, Greenpoint, on March 25, 1912, and on conferences and happenings prior to that date having to do with the alleged conspiracy. Greenpoint is Senator Carroll's bailiwick.

ONE OF DEFENDANTS TURNS STATE'S EVIDENCE.

Right at the start Mr. Allen threw a bombshell into the defense by announcing that one of the defendant's, Thomas Owens, subsequent to the finding of the indictment had visited the District Attorney's office and made a full and complete confession which would be corroborated. Owens' fellow defendants turned to look at him and Owens turned even.

He has but one arm and bears other marks showing a disposition to do battle. It is understood that after his indictment on the conspiracy charge he was arrested for shooting a boy and in order to get off as lightly as possible on that charge he volunteered to turn State's evidence in the case now on trial.

Not an inkling of his course had reached the other defendants, but they realized that he had hit almost from them in the courtroom today. Mr. Allen announced that Owens would be one of the witnesses for the State.

Mr. Allen gave to the jury what he declared was a recital of the way the primary was conducted at No. 25 North Sixth street, a barber shop, 1622 feet. The ballots did not reach the polling place until 3 o'clock in the evening.

Members of the Sirocco gang of Manhattan and another gang of gunmen from Coney Island had been hired, Mr. Allen said, to "work" in the primary. When the polling place opened Senator Carroll, Mr. Allen said, got on a chair, from which point of vantage he could observe every part of the room, including the interior of the booths, and announced that he was going to "boss" the primary.

John Brady, Chairman of the Board and Michael Rosenthal, an inspector, objected, Mr. Allen said, and were forcibly ejected from the polling place. Senator Carroll, the prosecutor, declared, specified who should vote and who should not, ran men in through a rear entrance to vote on names that had been furnished them and voted nine of his henchmen after the polls had legally closed.

FOOD DEALERS FINED \$500.

One Pays \$250 for Bad Eggs, Another for Spoiled Turkey.

Herbert Baldwin, proprietor of a produce store at No. 261 Greenwich street, was today fined \$500 in Special Sessions after pleading guilty to the charge of having had 25 pounds of eggs not fit for consumption in his place of business on Sept. 2 last. The fine was paid.

The National Food Supply Company, in business at Sixth avenue and Tenth street, was today fined \$500 in Special Sessions for having 100 pounds of turkey not fit for consumption in the premises.

She returned a few days ago from Europe to find her husband was fighting to have the decree made final, and that a guardian had been asked for her daughter, Nathalie. The statement bearing her signature says in part:

"After much deliberation and thought I have determined to let the community know why I have lost Nathalie. Nathalie, like all girls of her age and beauty, had much admiration this summer, and when fall arrived did not wish to return to boarding school.
