Stars of Army Eleven in Line-Up Against Middies

(Special to The Evening World.) WEST POINT, N. Y., Nov. 28.—The return to the squad of Huston, Benedict and Hodgson was the most gratifying of yesterday's developments in connection with the Army's preparation for the Navy battle. The big trio worked in signal drill and, although Huston's limited knowledge of the new code of signals "gummed" things for a while, the coaches were mighty glad to get him back after an absence of four weeks. Meacham's injury received in Saturday's contest made Huston's "come back" a matter of immediate

play and is doing well. Hodgson, who was operated on last week for the removal of a blood clot on his leg, is in fine fettle, and in yesterday's punting drill averaged fifty yards with his long twisting spirals. He will get in Saturday's game, barring accident this week and will be depended upon to do the kicking for the Cadets. Hodgson is fast and heavy and is one of the Army's best open field runners. He runs low, is an adept dodger and is a particularly hard man to down. With Benedict at full, Capt. "Benny" Hoge at the other half and Erichard driving the team in quarters, the Army will be able to present its strongest combination behind the line. Meacham's injury is not as serious as was first believed and he is expected to play part of the Navy game at guard. He is still in the hospital, but will get back to-morrow or "hurday."

40,000 PEOPLE WILL SEE ARMY AND NAVY PLAY.

FORTY-ONE THOUSAND seats have been sold for the Army-Navy football game Saturday at the Polo Grounds. This is the capacity of the grounds, and creates a record for New York. It will be the largest crowd that ever attended a game outside of the Harvard Stadium. More than 20,000 applications for seats could not be filled. The Army and Navy teams received more than \$2,000 tickets. The Navy team is favored in the betting, but there will be plenty of Army money this season.

Toronto University will be met on Dec. 22, the next day the Boston A. Reddy Loses To Williams


