

# GANGSTER HIDES AFTER A SHOOTING, VICTIM IS DYING

Police Trail "Hunchback Joe," Accused of Holdup in East Side Restaurant.

Detectives struck the trail to-day of an east side gangster known as "Hunchback Joe" who is accused of shooting Durblovitch in the latter's restaurant at No. 96 Henry street last night because Durblovitch refused to give him \$5 and a companion had demanded. Durblovitch is dying in Gouverneur Hospital.

The hunchback is in hiding at a place the detectives have located. His companion is believed to be with him. Michael Belsch of No. 125 Cherry street and Perah Durblovitch, a brother of the wounded restaurant keeper, were arraigned before Magistrate Breen in Centre Street Police Court to-day and held without bail as material witnesses in the case. They witnessed the shooting but their stories have not satisfied the police that they have been entirely frank.

For weeks merchants near the New York end of the Manhattan Bridge have been the victims of blackmailing gunmen who usually get money in small amounts because that is regarded as the best way to keep them peaceable. The restaurant at No. 96 Henry street was owned by Durblovitch and Stephen Warsowitz, who sold it last Wednesday to Samuel Charvis of No. 65 Canal street.

The new owner completed the sale last night by paying \$75, and the parties divided the money and were celebrating with the new owner, his wife and ten friends, when two men brushed in with caps drawn over their eyes and demanded \$5 of Durblovitch. The crowd was singing a Polish song at the time. The demand was so unexpected that Durblovitch stammered. It was all he had, and handed out a dollar. The hunchback, without making a second demand, drew a revolver and shot him in the right temple.

Policeman Schmitzer of the Madison street station was on the scene a minute after the shooting, but the men had disappeared.

## OPPOSITION TO STATE RELIGION IN CHINA

Mohammedans, Buddhists and Christians Form a League to Contest Confucianism.

PEKING, Nov. 25.—A league for the purpose of opposing the adoption of a state religion in China was organized here to-day at a meeting held at the Young Men's Christian Association and composed of representatives of Mohammedanism, Taoism, Buddhism, Roman Catholicism and Protestantism.

President Yuan Shi Kai, whose mandates are now regarded as approximate to the imperial edicts of the former era, describes the sayings of Confucius, in a mandate promulgated to-day, as "a doctrine of unequalled wisdom which is recognized as such by any foreigners as well as Chinese; deep

The Constitution adopted by the Chinese Parliament made no provision for any state religion, but a Presidential mandate promulgated to-day evidently anticipates the selection of Confucianism, of which the adherents have been laboring sedulously for some time to secure the taking of this step by the President.
