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TWELVE MORE ARE RESCUED FROM STRANDED COBEQUID; 108 SAVED; NONE LOST

Captain and Eleven Men Who Had Remained Aboard Taken Off To-Day.

96 SAFE AT YARMOUTH. Daring Rescues From Wrecked Liner Pounding to Pieces in Bay of Fundy.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Jan. 15.—Agents of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company received word to-day that Captain Lawson and the eleven men who remained on the Cobequid-impaled on Trinity Rock in the Bay of Fundy—after the rest of the crew and passengers were rescued had been taken on board the Government steamer Lansdowne and were on their way here.

The captain did not leave the Cobequid until it was certain she would be a total loss.

A wireless message said that the third officer, R. F. Powell, had been injured during the night and was in need of medical attention.

YARMOUTH, N. S., Jan. 15.—The twenty-four passengers and seventy-two members of the crew of the steamer Cobequid, rescued yesterday, are comfortably housed here and recovering from the effects of their long exposure to icy winds and waves.

The United States Revenue Cutter Service received wireless messages to-day from cutters of the New England coast, where they have been adding distressed vessels in the region.

The cutter Hagan reported from Provincetown, Mass., that she had picked up the schooner John Hart and Pearl Wilson off Cape Cod in distress and had towed them to Provincetown Harbor.

The schooner, carrying out of Boston, with crew and passengers, was picked up by the cutter Hagan, which was on duty in the region.

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
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Missing Wife Whom Broker May Seek Under Mann Law

BOSTON, Jan. 15.—The foundering of the Bath schooner Grace A. Martin, thirty miles south of Matineus Matineus Rock yesterday, and the timely rescue of her crew of seventeen men from an open boat one hundred miles off shore by the steamer A. W. Perry, Halifax for Boston, was reported by wireless to-day.

For nearly twenty-four hours the Martin's crew, in an open boat nearly 100 miles off shore, battled against death under the bitterest of weather conditions. The distance from the spot where the schooner foundered to the steamer route between Boston and Halifax is fifty miles, which represents the drift of the Martin's longboat from shortly after sunrise yesterday until dawn to-day, when the castaways were picked up by the Perry.

The Grace A. Martin, heavily loaded with coal, sailed from Norfolk for Portland, Me., on Monday. She was caught in the westerly gale off Cape Cod on Monday, but her skipper decided to continue across the Maine shore instead of seeking shelter at Provincetown. The vessel was driven further and further off shore on Tuesday. Two days of hard pounding opened up her beams, it is believed, and she tilted and sank. The crew probably had sufficient warning to take some food and heavy clothing before jumping into their longboat.

The Grace A. Martin was a five-masted vessel, built at Bath in 1884 and registered 1,970 tons net.

Another card was a membership ticket in the Merchantville, N. J., Field Club, made out to "Frank H. Ruth," a Pennsylvania Railroad ticket stamped Merchantville, N. J., a gold watch with the initials F. H. R., \$5 in cash, several newspaper clippings, pills and tablets completed the possessions found in the man's pockets.

The newspaper clippings showed the picture of the man "Frank H. Ruth and his five sons," with reference to several baseball games played by the father and boys.

\$1,500 DUG IN CELLAR; QUESTION: WHOSE IS IT?

Pindin's Not Keeper's, Unless Court Says So, State's Attorney Declares.

"DOPEY BENNY" AND GANG PALS FREED BY CORONER

Prosecutor Reports No Evidence to Hold Them for Straus Murder.

SLEUTHS ARE STUNNED. Gangsters in Court Jubilant When Prisoners Are Let Go.

By agreement between the police and the District Attorney "Dopey Benny" Fain, "Little Able" Beckerman, Reuben Kaplan and "Axie" Gordon, arrested last Saturday on suspicion of being implicated in the shooting of Frederick Straus, assistant clerk of the City Court, were discharged to-day by Coroner Fainberg. The police have been unable to gather convincing evidence that the men under arrest were engaged in the gang revolver fight in front of Arlington Hall in St. Mark's place in which Mr. Straus was killed by getting between the opposing lines of fire.

The courtroom was crowded when "Dopey Benny" and his three companions were arraigned before Coroner Fainberg. In the audience were young men of the east side, who are seen about the Criminal Courts Building and the Tombs whenever there is a case on having to do with gang activity.

Acting Capt. Cooper of the First Detective District and several of his men were on hand with their witnesses. Apparently they had not consulted with the District Attorney's office prior to the beginning of the proceedings, for their surprise was apparent when Assistant District Attorney Murphy arose and asked that the prisoners be discharged.

"The District Attorney," said Mr. Murphy, "has no evidence in his possession to warrant asking for the further detention of the four defendants."

C. G. F. Walsh, counsel for the prisoners, asked if there was any other investigation into the death of Mr. Straus on foot which had any bearing on the defendants. Coroner Fainberg replied that he knew of no such an investigation and ordered the discharge of the prisoners.

"Dopey Benny" and his friends walked out of court smiling. The detectives followed crestfallen.

"Well, what do you know about that?" remarked one of the sleuths to another. "He didn't call a witness."

Upon reaching the street "Dopey Benny" announced that he desired to make a statement to the reporters. This is his statement:

"On my word of honor I had nothing to do with this shooting. My repeated arrests are part of a conspiracy against me because I refused to do certain things to satisfy a certain official of this city."

GRAND JURY IS PROBING THAT \$30,000 'ADVICE'

Questions Harry B. Hangar of Louisville Relative to Payments on Aqueduct Contract.

The Grand Jury empaneled by Justice Davis to investigate the charges of unjust contract fraud, to-day resumed its questioning of Harry B. Hangar of the firm of Mason & Hangar, contractors, of Louisville, Ky.

Mr. Hangar's firm had a contract for work on Section 29 of the Catskill Aqueduct, and in a civil suit before Justice Tompkins in Rockland County, last September, he testified that before he got the contract he paid James E. Gaffney two sums of \$5,000 for "expert advice."

The Grand Jury wants to know what this "advice" was.

Three Gun Carriers Held. Acting under orders from Deputy Commissioner George Dougherty, the detectives at the Oak street station continued their cleanup of gun carriers in that precinct to-day. Three more were arrested this morning by Detective Birmingham. Magistrate Deuel, in the Centre Street Police Court, held all three for trial in \$1,000 each. The prisoners were Nat Mazzini of No. 29 Oliver street, Carlo D'Amico of No. 10 W. 14 Oliver street. All are saloon keepers.

BURIED AMID LAVA, VICTIMS OF VOLCANIC DISASTER ARE SAVED

Men From Japanese Warships Make Strange Rescue of Group of Thirty-three.

KAGOSHIMA, Japan, Jan. 15.—A strange scene was witnessed to-day on the island of Sakura, when a group of thirty-three famished terror-stricken persons were rescued from amid steaming lava and heated boulders by a boat from a Japanese warship. A cruiser squadron arrived here to-day and launched boats at once lowered. The crews of which searched the island, the contour of which has been entirely altered since the bursting into eruption on Jan. 12 of the volcano of Sakurajima. The sailors did not risk landing but made a systematic scrutiny.

All was desolation and no sign of human beings was seen until evening, when an officer in one of the launches noticed something being waved in the air at a short distance from the shore.

A detachment of men was landed, and after a hard struggle succeeded in making their way through soft, warm ashes that had piled up until they reached a great rock. Covering behind they found the thirty-five persons, still living, but coated with thick dust and weakened by starvation and thirst.

The rescued were taken on board a warship and provided with food and drink. They explained that they had hidden in a great cave near the shore until the rain or ashes was over and had then tried hour after hour to attract attention.

The vessels of the cruiser squadron brought with them a large stock of provisions, with which they are relieving the hunger of the people of Kagoshima, many of whom have returned, only to find their houses destroyed and are consequently compelled to camp in the open spaces.

The general volcanic activity on the island of Kiuibusu is gradually abating and the work of restoring railroad and telegraphic communication is being proceeded with.

Damage in this city is immense, but no approximate estimate can yet be made of the loss of human life.

WILSON OFFERS AID TO MIKADO FOR THE EARTHQUAKE SUFFERERS.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—On receiving further details of the earthquake and tidal waves in Japan President Wilson to-day sent a second cablegram to the Emperor of Japan as follows:

"Permit me again to express to you the deep sympathy which the American people feel for their sister nation, Japan, in her great calamity. My heart goes out to the thousands upon whom suffering and disaster have come so suddenly and in so terrible a form. Is there any way in which we can help?"

SUES FOR BOY'S DEATH.

School Principal and Attendance Charged With Being Responsible.

Upon the charge that they were responsible for the death of Alden Mayo, a thirteen-year-old boy, an inmate of the New York Parental School, at Flushing, Herbert H. Todd, the principal, and Justice Saunders, an attendant, were to-day before Justice Crass in the Queens County Supreme Court.

The papers charge maladministration and the practicing of medicine by Saunders without a license. It is alleged that on May 23, 1913, young Mayo reported sick. But as he was a member of the school band he was permitted to go to Jamaica on May 26 and play in a parade, where he collapsed and was taken to the school. On the following day it is charged he had to go through school band exercises. Saunders later administered pills and oils to him, it is said. The boy became unconscious on June 4, was taken to the Jamaica Hospital under a physician's orders and died there next day.

'COMBS FOR BENCH, A CITY HALL REPORT

Appointment by Glynn Said to Be Part of Agreement With Wilson Forces.

City Hall political gossip has it today that there is now a coalition of forces between President Wilson, Gov. Glynn and Mayor Mitchell, and that as a result William F. McCombe, Chairman of the Democratic National Committee, is to be appointed Supreme Court Judge in the place vacated by James W. Gerard, now Ambassador to Germany. It is said the appointment was offered to Mr. McCombe last week when he visited the Governor.

Organization Democrats say they thought up to a very short time ago that Bartow S. Weeks, defeated candidate for the Supreme Court Judgeship, would be selected by Gov. Glynn to fill the vacancy, and that Abraham I. Elkus, defeated Tammany candidate for the Judgeship of the Court of Appeals would be named for that court. Anti-Tammany Democrats claim that the Governor would think twice before appointing two defeated candidates.

There is reported to be a very strong effort to cause a complete break between the Governor and Charles F. Murphy. If the Governor can be induced to appoint McCombe, it was said to-day, the break will be complete.

CINCINNATI, O., Jan. 15.—Outfielder Johnny Bates to-day signed a one-year contract to play with the Cincinnati National League team. Bates stated that he had been approached by men representing themselves to be from the Federal League but had decided not to desert the local club.
