

RICH IMPORTER'S WILL IS STOLEN; WITNESS IS HELD

Document Vanishes From Hall of Records After Being Filed There.

WEISBERG QUESTIONED.

Declares He Was Cited for Contempt, and Not for the Knowledge of Paper.

Clerks of the Surrogate's Court and of the Farmers' Loan and Trust Company continued today the search for the second will of Ed Fisher, an importer, which, it was discovered yesterday, has disappeared from the files of the Hall of Records.

David Weisberg, a friend of Fisher, and his wife were the witnesses of the May 4 will. Mr. Weisberg was subpoenaed in court by Justice Coblan yesterday until 4 o'clock, after a complaint had been made out against him with contempt of court.

At his home, No. 411 Edgecombe avenue, Mr. Weisberg wrote the following statement, by way of proving that nobody had charged him with knowing anything about the disappearance of the will: "My connection with the will of Ed Fisher is simply that of a witness.

SAYS HE WAS TOO ILL TO APPEAR IN COURT.

"The case could not be postponed so long and was carried over until Jan. 19 and we were both carried that morning. Mrs. Weisberg could not attend, I having been served, was prepared to appear, but was taken ill at the store. (Mr. Weisberg is a department superintendent of R. M. Levy & Co.), where I was under a doctor's care for three hours.

Father Points to Harry Jacobs' Will, Which Surrogate Threw Out.

QUEER DOINGS OVER IT.

Widow's Brother Appears in Some Relation to All the Disputed Documents.

Two promissory notes for \$2,500 each purporting to have been signed by Harry Jacobs, former partner of Herman Rosenthal, were declared to be forgeries in an affidavit filed in the Supreme Court to-day by Mahlon A. Freeman, attorney for Jacobs' father, Isidore Jacobs.

The matter came up before Justice Giegerich on a motion made by Charles J. Lane, attorney for Dr. McDonald, for a commission to examine both Dr. McDonald and Dr. Jacobs in Chicago. The justices decided that both witnesses would have to come on to New York.

ENGINEER, IN SUIT, SAYS HERMAN RIDDER BEAT HIM

ASTOR GREENHOUSES DESTROYED BY FIRE
