ABRAHAM HAMMERSTEIN DEAD AFTER STORMY LIFE

Oscar's Youngest Son Had Two Wives and Recently Escaped From Sanitarium.

The brief but tempestuous career of Abraham Lincoln Hammerstein, youngest son of Oscar Hammerstein, came to an end to-day. The young man died in the Hotel Cadillac where he had been under the care of nurses for several days following his escape from a sanitarium. The body was removed to Campbell's Undertaking Rooms in West Twenty-third street, pending arrangements for the funeral.

Young Hammerstein, having just attained his majority, in January, 1908, married seventeen-year-old Ethel Britton, a salesgirl, living in the Bronx. It was a runaway match. The elder Hammerstein forgave his son, but the young couple separated after a couple of years and Hammerstein began a suit for divorce in September, 1910.

Evidently thinking that bringing a suit was sufficient to free him, he married Miriam Henriques, an actress, at Niagara Falls on Sept. 4, 1911, and brought her to New York.

where he installed her in his father's quarters in the Victoria Theatre. Abraham and his wife were promptly driven out by William Hammerstein, Abraham's elder brother, and Abraham then left his second wife.

The second wife, learning that her husband had not been divorced, tried in vain to have him prosecuted for bigamy. Abraham's lawyers revived the divorce suit and he got a decree in January, 1912. In September of that year he tried to get his second marriage annulled in Buffalo, but the judge threw the case out of court.

Little was seen of Abraham on Broadway after that and it is understood his family sent him to a sanitarium. In September of last year his second wife, through her counsel, George Simpson, of No. 21 Park Row, brought a suit for \$50,000 damages against William Hammerstein, which is pending.

PROSECUTOR SAYS POLICE SHIELDED MARY MACK

Asks Heaviest Sentence for Her, but Court Gives Her Only Two Months in Prison.

When Mary Mack was convicted in General Sessions to-day of maintaining a disorderly resort, Assistant District Attorney Groehl demanded the heaviest possible sentence for her—one year in the penitentiary and a \$500 fine—on the ground that she had suborned perjury and had been paid for suborning perjury by receiving assurances of non-interference by the police.

Mr. Groehl said that he was in a position to prove that Mary Mack procured a girl who had been a resident in the flat of Mrs. Mary Goode to come out with sworn denials of Mary Goode's testimony before the Curran police investigating committee and had been rewarded by police "protection."

CARRIAGE HITS TROLLEY.

Pete Smashes Car and Seriously Injures Woman Passenger.

Howard Allen of No. 682 Prospect place, Brooklyn, did not notice an approaching Nostrand avenue trolley car as he guided his horse, attached to a coach in which four persons were returning from the Holy Family Hospital, through Snyder avenue, Flatbush, this afternoon. Car and coach met head on and the pole of the coach smashed through the side of the car, striking Mrs. Minnie Henchle of No. 167 East Forty-fifth street, in the left side, breaking two ribs and causing internal injuries.

The pole broke off and the horses ran up Nostrand avenue for two blocks before Allen could stop them. Mrs. Henchle was taken to the Kings County Hospital.
