PANIC ON FIRE ESCAPE WHEN SMOKE SWEEPS THE LOWER SECTIONS

Crowd Seeking to Descend Struggles With Those Who Wish to Come Upward. A congregation of humanity on the front fire escape of a six-story tenement at No. 24 Suffolk street early today might have resulted in several fatalities but for the timely arrival of Truck Company No. 24, which raised ladders and took off about two dozen persons, forcing the others back into their apartments, as the fire was of trivial nature and not threatening the building. The blaze is supposed to have been caused by rats gnawing matches in Harry Levinson's grocery, on the street floor. Next to the match stock were two barrels of sugar, which burns with a heavy black smoke. A pedestrian kicked in the front door of the grocery before the flames arrived and released that black smoke, which ascended and waked the tenants as it was blown into windows.

GLADSTONE TO RESIGN SOUTH AFRICAN POST

But House of Commons Told His Retirement as Governor Is Not Due to Strike Troubles. LONDON, Feb. 11.—Lewis Harcourt, Secretary of State for the Colonies, to-day formally notified the House of Commons that Viscount Gladstone would cease to be Governor-General of the Union of South Africa in June. He added that the reason for his resignation was purely domestic and had no connection with the events arising out of the recent general strike in South Africa and the deportation of strike leaders.

DROPS DEAD IN THEATRE.

Brooklyn Woman is Stricken in Manhattan Opera House Lobby. Two women and a girl of nineteen started into the Manhattan Opera House last night when one of the women turned to the girl and said: "Violet, I am very ill." She then fell to the floor of the lobby. She was carried into the women's rest room, where a doctor said she was dead. The other woman, who remained outside with the girl, said she was Mrs. J. D. Alderice of No. 332 Greene avenue, Brooklyn, and that the dead woman was Mrs. Willette Maxwell, forty, wife of Thomas Maxwell of the same address. She said the girl is Mrs. Maxwell's daughter Violet. Mrs. Alderice took Miss Maxwell home in a cab and there she was told that her mother was dead. Mr. Maxwell believed apoplexy had caused his wife's death. The coroner gave permission for the removal of Mrs. Maxwell's body to her home.
