FIXED BAYONETS END DANCE RIOT; GUARDSMEN HELD

Militiamen, Ordered Under Arrest by Captain of 47th, Charged With Disobedience.

Three rumpled and bruised militiamen, not in uniform, stood before Magistrate Leach in the Manhattan Avenue Court, Williamsburg, to-day, while the Court heard of their march of disgrace, under guard of ten uniformed militiamen with fixed bayonets and three policemen with unfixed nightsticks, from the Forty-seventh Regiment Army at Marcy avenue and Heyward street, to the City street police station.

The regiment had a review last night, followed by dancing. Commodore Robert E. Forsberg of the Naval Militia was reviewing officer, with Col. Amos Jannicks of the Forty-seventh. After the review, when the floor was filled with dancers, Capt. Hubert Eldert of Company L saw among the spectators Private Martin Hirsch, who had not been in the ranks and was not in uniform.

Put on your uniform and report to me in the company room at once," ordered Capt. Eldert, and retired to the room to await the private. Hirsch walked in a moment later, still in uniform. It is charged he began cursing Eldert, charging him with unfairness and incompetence. The captain ordered a number of uniformed men to put Hirsch under arrest.

OTHER PRIVATES SIDE WITH MAN UNDER ARREST. The loud talk attracted a crowd to the door. Privates Samuel Scheinberg and Harry Cohen, who were also in uniform, went, it is said, to the aid of Hirsch. There were others who sided with him, and there was a free fight, in which Hirsch and Cohen were freely used. It boiled out through the door to the dancing floor, and screaming women ran to the ends of the drill hall while their escorts joined in the fray.

Policemen Maxwell, Brennan and Hines were called in. Capt. Eldert collected a squad, ordered them to take their guns from the racks and six bayonets, who were also in uniform, placed Hirsch, Scheinberg and Cohen under arrest. As they were leaving the armory there was a rush of friends of the prisoners who had been waiting in the street outside. Capt. Eldert at once sent out his squad of ten, who formed about the prisoners and policemen in a hall, who were also in uniform. The three policemen followed all the way to the station by a mixed crowd of soldiers and outsiders, who hooted the prisoners and their guards with hurrahs.

DOWN AS OWING BILLS TO THE CAFE DE PARIS

Schedules Name W. K. Vanderbilt, H. C. Phipps and Marcus Loew Among Others. In a list of persons owing the bankrupt Cafe de Paris, filed in the United States District Court to-day are named Vanderbilt, Loew, Kuhn, Surran, Wanmaker and Lamar. John Wanmaker is down as owing the restaurant \$295.45. The cafe went into bankruptcy three weeks ago. According to the schedule it has liabilities aggregating \$295,028 and assets of \$29,244. Of the assets \$75,431 is fixed as the value of the cafe's fittings.

BRITISH INCOME TAX ON MARSHALL FIELD MONEY

LONDON, Feb. 28.—The Court of Appeal has decided that Mrs. Marshall Field Jr. is liable for the payment of income tax in England on money remitted to her from the United States under the provisions of the will of her late husband and his father for the education of her three children. The suit was brought by the British Collector of Taxes in respect of a sum of \$50,000 remitted to Mrs. Drummond in the year 1905, but the effect of the judgment is to render her liable for the payment of income tax on all sums remitted to her under the will of Marshall Field.

NEW WHITE SLAVES IN CITY, SAYS F. H. WHITIN

There are relatively few "white slaves" in this city, Frederick H. Whiting, Secretary of the Committee of Investigation, stated in an address on "Actual Moral Conditions in New York," at the assembly rooms of the Women's Municipal League, No. 10 East Twenty-ninth street, by the name of "white slaves" he meant, he said, women who were forced into a life of physical or mental compulsion, and there still are here, he added, a large number of women who are used in the commercial world of men. He went on to say that the "lid" is not on pretty tight all over town, and that there are now more disorderly houses than ever before. The law is not enforced, and a disorderly house in Harlem which exists because the "police" are not enforcing the law. Whiting said that the Committee of Investigation had investigated every one of the so-called "peppercorn" cases and had found not one of the instances substantiated.
