

**DIVORCE NOT ENOUGH;
WIFE ASKS A RECALL**

Mrs. Eggers of San Francisco, Wed 35 Years, Says Sheriff Is Unfit for Office.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 3.—Mrs. Eggers, wife of Frederick S. Eggers, Sheriff of San Francisco County, who has sued him for divorce, announced today in a signed statement that she would circulate a petition for his recall from office. They have lived together thirty-five years.

"This is not spits work," said Mrs. Eggers. "I simply do not believe that Sheriff Eggers is a fit man to be in a public office."

In her statement Mrs. Eggers outlined testimony which she gave before a Grand Jury.

**SENTENCE TO PRISON
FOR AUTO SPEEDER
UPHELD ON APPEAL**

Judge Wadhams Commends Magistrate for Imposing Penalty on Taylor.

In an opinion handed down today by Judge Wadhams in General Sessions, automobilists who persist in violating the city ordinances regulating speed, deserve to go to prison. He denied the appeal of Grace William Taylor, sentenced to the workhouse for twenty days by City Magistrate Appleton.

"For a long time fines have been imposed by city magistrates in cases of violation of ordinances regulating speed," said Judge Wadhams, "but death and serious injuries caused by speeding automobiles continue to be common occurrences. Fines having failed to check reckless drivers, the imposition of jail sentences has become necessary for the prevention of these offenses."

According to the papers in the case, Taylor showed an utter disregard of life and law. On Aug. 7 last a policeman observed him on Broadway driving his automobile at the rate of thirty miles an hour in the vicinity of One Hundred and Eighteenth street. The policeman served a summons upon Taylor, who gave a fictitious name and address. On Jan. 23 he was stopped by another policeman at Seventh avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, who had timed him going twenty-four miles an hour for four blocks. This time he also gave a fictitious name and address. The same policeman arrested him Feb. 4 and took him before Magistrate Appleton. Taylor was identified by the first policeman. He was fined \$200 and sentenced to twenty days in the workhouse.

It was from this additional penalty that Taylor appealed.

"From the evidence," said Judge Wadhams, "it appears that the defendant has shown a lawless disposition in attempting to escape the results of his act by deception and in twice failing to obey the summons of the Court. Automobiles in the hands of such drivers are a menace to the safety of the public using the streets. The Magistrate in this case has properly imposed a jail sentence."

FOURTEEN GET LONGER STAY.

They Had Been Ordered Deported, but Court Aids Them.

Shortly before the steamer Dwinck of the Russian-American Line sailed today fourteen Capadonians, who had been ordered deported by the Ellis Island officials, were taken from the ship. An appeal taken by the Russian society to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals acted as a stay for the fourteen.

The Capadonians, all of whom are men, come from the Southeast of Russia near the Black Sea, the Biblical land of the Hittites. They came to New York on the steamship Cear. At Ellis Island the inspectors decided the men were liable to become public charges and they were ordered deported.

**FOUR STEAMERS HERE
AFTER PERIL IN GALES**

Capt. O'Barratt of the Surinam Held Prisoner on Bridge by Ice.

Four steamers from Southern ports arrived here today from twenty-four hours to two days late as a result of the hurricane down the coast. The Catherine Cuneo, a small Norwegian fruit steamer, commanded by Capt. S. E. Sorenson, ran into a storm on Sunday night and was driven 100 miles off her course.

Capt. Sorenson said it was impossible to fight against the gale. The ship was soon covered with ice and the crew was kept busy with axes freeing the working gear.

Capt. W. O'Barratt of the steamer Surinam was ready for a long sleep when his ship warped into her dock in the East River. He had no sleep for almost forty-eight hours. On Sunday night when the steamer ran into the hurricane Capt. O'Barratt and two of his mates went on the bridge. When dawn broke Monday morning they found themselves prisoners. The ice that formed on the ladders made it impossible for the three men to descend to the deck and the crew worked with axes on the ice for an hour before they were able to free themselves.

The steamship Araphos of the Clyde line arrived twenty-four hours late from Jacksonville. Capt. A. D. Ingram said his ship was so steady throughout the hurricane that the passengers who were holding a concert on Sunday night were not interrupted in their pleasure.

The Prinz Sigismund of the Hamburg-American line was buffeted by the hurricane for two days.
