piro and Child Sleep.

probably fatally burned Mrs. Celia
Shapiro and her eight months' old
son, Albert, who were in bed asleep
a few feet from the stove. The
mother and baby are in St. Mary's
Hospital, where the doctors say there
is little if any hope for their recov-
ery.

The woman's husband, Herman
Shapiro, was sleeping in another
room with two older children, Harry,
eight, and Lilly, six. He was awak-
ened about 4 o'clock by his wife's
screams. Before he was fully roused
she lost consciousness and the
screams ceased.

Shapiro, half awake, thought the
cries had come from the street. He
put his feet into slippers, intending
to look out a front window to see
what had happened. Just then he
smelled smoke.

He dashed to his wife's room and
saw the bed in flames, the wrecked
oil stove lying where it had fallen
on the floor. The carpet was ablaze
by that time. Shapiro dragged his
wife and baby from the bed and beat
out the flames in their clothes, burn-
ing his own hands and arms painfully.

He cried loudly for help, arousing
the tenants on the floor below. They
shouted out of windows, bringing
Policemen Conley and Lang from
their posts and Capt. Mooney, Night
Watchman William Walters and
other firemen from the engine house
directly across the street.

Mrs. Shapiro and the baby were
carried downstairs while firemen beat
out the flames in her apartment. The
police sent in a call to St. Mary's
Hospital for an ambulance.

The fire did only small damage.
Mrs. Shapiro's father, David Merow-
itz, who lives next door to her, is con-
sidered wealthy. He owns both the
building in which he lives and that
in which his daughter lives.

FIRST WIFE WILL BURY PROF. PECK FROM HER HOME

Second Wife Wires First to
Make Whatever Funeral Ar-
rangements She Sees Fit.

STAMFORD, Conn., March 24.—
Mrs. Cornelia Dawhorn Peck, first
wife of Harry Thurston Peck, former
Columbia University professor, author,
educator and linguist, who shot and
killed himself yesterday, said to-day
that she should take entire charge of
the funeral of the man she divorced.
She received a telegram from Mrs.
Elizabeth Dubois Peck, the professor's
second wife, from her home in St.
George, R. I., saying that any arrange-
ments the first Mrs. Peck might make
would be satisfactory to her. The lat-
ter is not coming here so far as the
first Mrs. Peck knows.
Mrs. Cornelia Peck had her former
husband's effects moved to-day from
the lodging house where he killed
himself to her home at Sound Beach.
Among them was a certificate signed
by Dr. A. E. Austin of Sound Beach
in October, saying he would not be
responsible for the result if Peck
were brought into more court pro-
ceedings and that to recover his men-
tal health he must have complete
rest.
A pathetic light on the professor's
life is given in a letter from Mrs. Peck
to her mother, dated Oct. 10, 1913.
The letter is full of details of Peck's
life and his mental condition. It is
the first time that Mrs. Peck has
written to her mother since the
tragedy.


