

Biggest Ship That Ever Sailed The Stage Has Real Sailors

They're Lads From the Navy Yard and They Know How to Sing as They Scramble Up the Rigging in "Pinafore"—But a Small Boat in the Hippodrome Tank Almost Makes Little Buttercup Lose Her Song Overboard.

Now that spring navigation has opened at the Hippodrome the biggest ship that ever sailed the stage, together with its merry crew, has made "Pinafore" the talk of the port.

Everything that is listed under the some three thousand classified parts of an ancient "windjammer" is to be found in the huge old frigate that rises majestically out of the famous Hip tank of "real water." There are topsails and gaffs, main and mizzen masts, jibbooms and hawsers, marlin spikes and belaying pins, binnoles and booms, shrouds and rattlings and such truck in sufficient quantity to siddden the heart of an old salt.


For this realism much responsibility rests with one Westminster Abbey—not the ancient pile that adorns the right bank of the Thames in dear old Lunnnon, but a shrewd, thoroughly commercial naval stores dealer who presides over a modest script mass of maritime antiques in a chandlery at 61 Front street. Here "dead eyes," such as might have served in lieu of pulleys on the caravels of Columbus, brass cannon that broke himself might have employed against the Spanish armada, a bi-nozzle, such as might have been used to guide the "Half Moon" in its cruise up the Hudson, were unearthed, together with many another treasure that helps lend realism to Arthur Vogtlin's ancient frigate at the Hippodrome. Those were brought forth by Mr. Abbey with the same pride that an art dealer could be expected to exhibit if he produced a Raphael from some dusty old chest. When the meeting came to an end the Hippodrome producer had a few tons of junk and the ship chandler a heavy pocketbook.

Having acquired the ship-piece-meal, perhaps, but a ship never-the-less—the matter of a crew was not so hard to overcome. Every day scores of likely young men are discharged at the Brooklyn Navy Yard after completing their enlistment. It so happens that there are glee clubs and quartets on board Uncle Sam's fighting ships, and the young men who comprise them can, as a rule, dance as well. It is these husky lads who man the lofty yardarms of the "M. S. Pinafore," sing from that dizzy height and scramble down the rigging to do a hornpipe or two when occasion offers. No more navy for them so long as the stage is properly rigged with pretty girls!

It's all very fine for the jacksies, but the tar, the rusty old chains, the real boats bobbing about on real water, the sailors with real sailor ways and occasional "guss words" and the general atmosphere are strange and foreign to the singers who come under the head of "springsals."

Listen to Mrs. Josephine Jacoby, the grand opera singer who now, as Little Buttercup, makes her grand entrance in a bumbust cut low in the back.

"How do I like it?" Like it? I don't! A most villainous person rowns me out to the ship and invariably starts fussing when my number is due. He seems to think it is up to him to recover a straw hat that comes floating by at that moment or to turn the position of the punt, or something of that sort.



When I am trying to do my best a vagrant thought creeps into my mind that I am tempted to stop singing to say to him: "Sit down, you're rocking the boat."

But the sailors? "Like it, huh? Like it? Say, man, this kidding business puts it all over the fo'c'sle and aft horse," declared one old salt. "This is the softest thing I ever signed on—always in port, a real bed to sleep in every night, your money coming to you every Saturday night, canvas decks that don't need no holystoning, restaurants with real grub on every side, no cargo to trim or watches to stand, an' a swell bunch of dames an' dolls singin' their heads off all around you twice a day—this is wot I call a real pipe; I ain't much when it comes to singin', but mark 'e, this 'ere same 'Pinafore' is the craft for me. It's the finest ship I've ever seen on land."

HOPE FOR MRS. WAKEFIELD.

No Decision by Supreme Court in Case of Woman Slayer.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., April 15.—After a long executive consultation, the five Justices of the Supreme Court of Errors adjourned last evening until Wednesday without handing down any decision. One case pending is the petition for a new trial of Mrs. Beale J. Wakefield, who is at Wethersfield Prison awaiting hanging for the murder of her husband, James Plew, was hanged March 4 for the actual killing of Wakefield.

About 20,000 petitions are on file in Gov. Baldwin's office, most protesting against hanging a woman. If the Supreme Court denies a new trial, Mrs. Wakefield may appear before the Board of Pardons April 25, and the unanimous vote of the six members can save her from the gallows.






