

# TANGO MUST STOP AT 2, SAYS MAYOR; GIVES 19 LICENSES

### All-Night Privilege Withheld From Others While He Makes Investigation.

Mayor Mitchell this afternoon granted nineteen all-night licenses, which is the first batch since the report of the "Lal Committee" of seven appointed by him to investigate the question of closing time. In the list favorably passed on, those that have cabarets and where there is dancing and music will have to close at 2 A. M. Those that conduct regular restaurants will be permitted to remain open until 5 o'clock.

The applications for the licenses granted to-day were inspected by several of the Mayor's departments and passed upon unanimously. There are about fifteen applications which have not yet been passed upon. Action is deferred on them because of the fact that all of the investigators have not agreed that they should be granted licenses. The Mayor himself will now decide what steps should be taken in the cases of the doubtful applications.

Inspector Lower and several of his deputies were ready to fill in the West Side Police Court this morning how they had begun again to enforce strictly the 1 A. M. closing law, do note the general belief that Mayor Mitchell rather than a little later termination of restaurant activities. They did not get a chance, however, as the five men arrested last night in so many different places each waived examination and was held by Magistrate Ben Eyck in \$500 bail for trial in Special Sessions on the charge of violating the Liquor law.

The prisoners and the places where they were taken were: Ignatz Greenbaum, of 111 West 111th street; Louis Fangle, of 102nd Broadway and Forty-eighth street; John O'Brien, the Garden, Seventh avenue and Fifth street; John Menacho, the Peikin, Broadway and Forty-seventh street, and Benjamin Berry, Faust's, Columbus Circle.

In speaking of the arrests made last night of persons accused of violation of the Excise law in Broadway restaurants Police Commissioner Woods said to-day:

"The provisions of the places in which arrests were made have been persistent violators of the law. They might as well understand that until the Mayor's policy of all-night license regulations is promulgated the letter of the law must be observed. It is not my intention to make spectacular raids or put patrons of restaurants into the streets a few minutes after closing time, but it is my intention to see that the law is not openly violated."

"The men were warned by Commissioner McKay that they were in danger of prosecution if they did not comply with the provisions of the excise law regarding closing hours. They paid no attention to that warn-

ing. Then I learned that many restaurants were keeping open until three, four or five o'clock in the morning, conducting dances and selling drinks. Through Inspector Lower reported Commissioner McKay's warning and again the warning was ignored. I then notified the Inspector to send out men to get legal evidence. The evidence was obtained, warrants were sworn out and arrests were made.
