

HER LIFE SAVED BY THE KIND CITY, SHE IS GRATEFUL

Miss Helen Safarik Asks The Evening World to Thank Authorities.

A pink-cheeked, smiling little girl called at The Evening World office today to thank the city of New York for saving her life. She is sixteen-year-old Helen Safarik, No. 502 East Eighty-fourth street, who has just been discharged from the City Hospital on Blackwell's Island after one of the most remarkable cures on record. She was sent away "without a word" of her own blood in her body, and she and her people are insistent upon expressing their gratitude publicly to the physicians and nurses who cared for her, as the personal representatives of the city.

After a quarrel with William G. Smith, a salesman in the Scripps Club, a publishing concern at No. 39 East Thirty-first street, Elizabeth Van Rensselaer, who recently was divorced from W. L. Palmer, a hotel man of Albany and Saratoga, swallowed what she said was a tablet of bichloride of mercury to-day. She was hurried to Bellevue Hospital, where, following prompt medical treatment, the doctors say they have no doubt of her ultimate recovery. Mrs. Van Rensselaer, as she called herself since the divorce was granted a few months ago, has lived in a rooming house at No. 1 West Seventy-fourth street for several weeks. Previously she lived with her mother at No. 610 West One Hundred and Fifty-second street. She is the mother of a little daughter. Last October Mrs. Van Rensselaer met Smith through a mutual friend. Smith lives at No. 116 West Eighty-first street. The two became greatly interested in each other. It was not until they were very well acquainted that Mrs. Van Rensselaer learned that Smith is a married man, though separated from his wife. According to Smith, Mrs. Van Rensselaer is of a highly nervous temperament and is given to attacks of hysteria. 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N. Y. CENTRAL'S BIG BOND ISSUE PLAN APPROVED

Commerce Board Indorses Proposal to Put Out \$167,102,400 in Lake Shore Merger.

CAPTURE OF FOOTPAD EXPLAINS SERIES OF POSTAL ROBBERIES

Two Alleged Confederates Said to Have Confessed Looting of Post Offices.

A series of postoffice robberies are believed to have been explained with the arrest Saturday of Tom Conway of No. 619 Atlantic avenue, Brooklyn, charged with the highway robbery of Susan Streight, postmistress at Maywood, N. J., on March 28. Detectives Sullivan and Duane of Brooklyn found the suspect at his home and later in his room found four sticks of dynamite and twenty percussion caps.

The second visit of the detectives was timely, for as they were leaving two men entered. These had been implicated in the Maywood robbery when \$250 in stamps and \$98 in cash were taken, and the pair were arrested. One said he was John Rockefeller, twenty-one years old, of No. 49 West One Hundred and Seventh street, Manhattan, and the other gave his name as Harry Nathan, twenty-three years old, of No. 251 West Sixty-third street, Manhattan.

Conway had been turned over to the Federal authorities. The two new captives were held in the Adams street police station. Detective Duane, disguised, entered the cell next to them and says that during the night he overheard them tell of their previous jobs. To-day they were quizzed by Captain Coughlin, and the police say they confessed to robbing post-offices in Hartford and Kenil, N. J., and in Oceanport and Kenil, N. J.

FRANK H. HINES GETS \$5,000 JOB FROM MARKS

Harlem Man Lands Best Place in General Distribution of Municipal Plums.

Frank H. Hines, a Harlem man, was to-day appointed by Borough President Marx to the post of Superintendent of Public Buildings, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Julian Healy. The salary is \$5,000 a year. Hines has long been identified with building and architectural work. William A.
