GROUT AND ASHLEY MUST STAND TRIAL FOR FALSE REPORT

Court, However, Rules that Neither Profitted by Union Bank Statement.

Edward M. Grout, former President of the Union Bank of Brooklyn, and James T. Ashley, former cashier, must stand trial on indictments charging them with signing a quarterly report to the State Banking Department on April 2, 1910, which, it is claimed, was fraudulent. Supreme Court Justice Kelly to-day denied motions to dismiss the indictments. The Court wrote an opinion five pages in length. He says that much testimony that was incompetent was submitted to the Grand Jury, but enough competent evidence was adduced to justify the indictment. The crux of the case against Grout and Ashley, the Court says, is the intent of the men in signing the report. Stephen C. Baldwin contended that Grout signed the report merely as a formality to comply with the banking laws, and that the report was similar to the State Banking Department's own report forwarded to him a short time previously. "I cannot find that District-Attorney Crosey created an atmosphere before the Grand Jury which was prejudicial to the defendants," says the Court. "If that were a ground for dismissal few indictments would stand." The charges made is that Grout and Ashley verified the report on their "best knowledge and belief" to the effect that the bank was entirely solvent on March 25, 1910. Two days after the report was signed, on April 2, 1910, the bank failed. The Court says it is possible that Grout and Ashley were entirely without criminal fault and pointed out that nowhere is it charged that either Grout or Ashley profited by the report.

COMMISSION FOR DURVEA.

Indicted for Killing His Father but May Not Be Tried.

Chester Bernell Durvea, who shot his father, Gen. Hiram Durvea, on the morning of May 2, 1914, while the aged soldier was asleep on a porch at his home at No. 121 Eighth-fifth street, Bay Ridge, was indicted for murder in the first degree to-day. Durvea is in the psychopathic ward of Bellevue Hospital. He was not brought to court. After the indictment was returned to Judge Fawcett, District-Attorney Crosey asked the Court to name a Commission to legally determine the responsibility of Durvea. This motion was not opposed by Robert H. Huntington, the Durvea family's attorney, who was present in court. A Commission will later visit the hospital and report to Judge Fawcett on Durvea's mental condition. Durvea's family claims that the son was insane for some time previous to the murder.

NOT DRUNK, JUST DOPEY.

Fireman Charged With Intoxication Blames Fall From Engine. Engineer Michael J. Kelley of Engine Company No. 123 at Rosebank, Staten Island, was suspended from duty to-day by Fire Commissioner Adamson after a trial in the new headquarters in the Municipal Building.

Charged with intoxication, Kelley defended himself by saying he had not been in good health since he fell from a wagon of Engine Company No. 19, of Manhattan, with which he was connected before he was transferred to Staten Island. Kelley asserts he has had dizzy and "dopey" spells since the fall and that what his superiors have taken to be intoxication was nothing more than mental disturbance. He has been up on charges three times before.

SNOW IN THE ADIRONDACKS.

Guides Report an Eight-inch Fall at Pine Lake.

GLOVERSVILLE, N. Y., May 14.—Guides here to-day from Pine Lake, in the Adirondacks, report that eight inches of snow fell there in the twenty-four hours preceding their departure last night. Four inches of snow is reported at Lake Pleasant and other sections of the Adirondacks report a heavy snowfall. Big drifts from last winter's heavy snows linger in many of the wooded sections.

'THE FERRET,' NO BIGGER THAN 'HOPO' MYTHUMB,' IS CAUGHT IN THE ACT

Diminutive but Aged Thief Has Spent 25 Years in Sing Sing.

A burglar alarm at No. 629 Sixth avenue notified the police that there was something wrong in the gown shop of Sarah Cohen at that place early to-day. When Policeman Vatter of the West Thirtieth street station, with several private patrolmen, reached the store gowns were found scattered in profusion. The door was intact and the windows locked. The sleuths discovered that the only open entrance was through a pipe closet, not more than a foot square and containing two pipes leading from the cellar. Search was made in the cellar, where the searchers heard a wheeze in the coal pile and finally a weak call for help. George Coppinger, sixty-four years old, weighing less than one hundred pounds and four feet eight inches tall, was rescued from the coal.

The little man said that he had heard a noise in the shop and had leaped over the coal hole to investigate. He lost his balance, fell in and was buried deep in the coal. George was taken to the police station, where he was recognized as "The Ferret," who has a long prison record. The police say that he was sent to Sing Sing for burglary in 1877 for two years and six months. On Nov. 26, 1880, he returned to Sing Sing for fifteen years for robbing the home of former Mayor Smith Ely on Twenty-sixth street near Fifth avenue. "The Ferret" escaped on Nov. 18, 1881, by stowing himself in a bread basket and covering himself up with stale bread. He was carried back to the bakery and got away. His love for the bowery resulted in his capture three nights later. "The Ferret" says Gov. Flower pardoned him. In November, 1893, George was found in the chapel house of Grace Church with several articles from the chapel house and was sent to Sing Sing for six years. In 1899 he received an eight year sentence for burglary and in 1908 was returned to Sing Sing for four years. In all, "The Ferret" acknowledges that he has been sentenced to Sing Sing for thirty-five years and six months and has spent a quarter of a century "up the river."

Banker Howe Dead.

John Howe, sixty-eight years old, a leading citizen of Nutley, N. J., died yesterday. He was President of the Bank of Nutley, secretary of the firm of George La Monte & Son, paper manufacturer, and formerly a Freeholder. Mr. Howe attended the bankers' convention at Atlantic City Friday and became ill after the banquet. He was born in Somerset, England, and came to this country in 1872.

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
