

MOB TRIES TO WRECK CROWDED STREET CAR; TWO ARE HURT IN RIOT

After Being Passed By, Angry Club Members Put Obstruction on Trolley Track.

Two men are in St. John's Hospital, Long Island City, to-day, seriously injured as a result of an attempt of 2,000 members and adherents of the Buckwurst Club to stop crowded street cars as they whizzed past them at Steinway avenue and Broadway, Astoria, last night.

The club, a Manhattan organization, had an outing yesterday at Astoria Schuetzen Park, and at 10 o'clock the members gathered to wait for cars to take them back to Manhattan. The cars, returning from North Beach, were crowded to suffocation, and they didn't even slacken speed when they reached the corner where the tired Buckwursters were waiting. The picknickers let a dozen cars go by, and then took things into their own hands.

Repairs are being made to Broadway, and at Steinway avenue barriers have been put up, closing the street

to traffic. One of these barriers was flung across the tracks, and the next car that came along struck it at full speed and flung it into the crowd. A number of women and some children were knocked down, and within another five minutes it was necessary to send in a call for the reserves.

Every car that came along was being charged from both sides. Many were pulled from the running boards, and those who were crowded along the guard rails on the inner sides found themselves borne down under the weight of men, and even women, who flung themselves in while the cars went by at only slightly slackened speed.

Two serious injuries resulted from this. J. J. Minton of No. 555 Eighth ave-

nue, Manhattan, was torn from his place on a running board, and suffered a compound fracture of the leg. Patrick Blessington of No. 525 West Forty-ninth street was knocked from one car by another passing in the opposite direction. He may die.

BULLS WIN BULL FIGHT.

In the event for amateurs the sword of one torreador was caught by the bull and tossed into the stand. It struck a spectator in the neck, killing him.

Later a Mexican swordsman, Miguel Frey, after killing the first bull, was mortally gored by the second. The fighting then stopped for the day.
