

VILLA REVOKES COMMISSIONS OF CARRANZA'S FOES

Removes Men From Army Whom First Chief Opposed and Denies Friction.

IN PERFECT ACCORD. Declares He Has No Idea of Intention of Leading a Counter-Revolution.

GUERRERO, Chihuahua, July 22.—Because of pressure brought by Gen. Venustiano Carranza against the appointment of Major Rodolfo Fierro and Col. Carlos Dominguez to be brigadier-generals in the Constitutional army Gen. Francisco Villa to-day revoked the appointments he recently made. Fierro is the man whom Carranza's envoys charged with killing William S. Benton, a British subject, and Dominguez is an open enemy of Gen. Carranza. It is understood that the United States objected to Fierro's selection.

In their stead Villa appointed Gen. Raoul Madero as commander of the old Ortega Brigade and Gen. Oraya as commander of the brigade of the late Gen. Trinidad Rodriguez. Raoul Madero is a brother of the late President, a veteran of the Madero war and a graduate of an American college.

Villa has come here for a few days of quiet before leaving with his forces for the south. This is the native place of his wife, who accompanied him. Before leaving Chihuahua Villa cancelled all leaves of absence in the Division of the North, so that all commands may be ready for a quick move.

Villa was angered by despatches reporting him as preparing to break with Carranza and lead a counter-revolution. He emphatically denied he had any such intention and insisted that he and Carranza were in perfect accord.

Messages announce that George C. Dorr, special agent of the United States Government, is en route here to urge Villa's avoidance of a split with Carranza. Villa is anxious to meet Carranza, saying he wishes to impress on the Washington Government his loyalty.

FEDERALS REPORT ARMISTICE SIGNED; AMNESTY GRANTED.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Official confirmation that the warring Mexican factions have signed an armistice was eagerly sought by Administration leaders to-day. The Brazilian Minister at Mexico City, in whose hands American interests now are, has sent nothing confirmatory of the statement of Gen. Iturbide, commanding the Federal district, that one will be proclaimed to-day. It is accepted by the Administration, however, that some

such action has been agreed upon. If an armistice covering all Mexico is announced it is considered certain Carranza has made certain promises to Carbajal. The latter has insisted that he must have guarantees of the lives of all Federals, although it is known that in these demands he admitted that men actually responsible for the death of Madero would not be covered by such amnesty.

While many obstructions still appeared to bar the way to peace in Mexico, yet despatches to-day from headquarters of both Constitutionalists and Federals expressed views that the end of fighting was in sight. The most menacing factor, it was said, was the attitude of Villa toward Carranza. Carranza declared, however, that there had been no fresh rupture and that now they were working "more or less in harmony."

Despatches from Mexico City to-day of the announcement by Gen. Iturbide, that an armistice had been signed and that peace negotiations would be advanced upon a basis of "giving full guarantees to everybody." Members of the Constitutional junta were known to be in the city. Carranza authorized the signing of terms for the Constitutionalists, but that Carranza was in telegraphic communication with the capital. Carranza's agents along the Rio Grande had orders to-day to take extraordinary precautions against the smuggling of war munitions across the border.

MEXICAN PRESS DEMANDS PAYMENT TO ALL AMERICANS.

MEXICO CITY, July 22.—Following the order of President Carbajal that the statue of George Washington be replaced on the pedestal from which it was torn down during the anti-American riots, a revulsion of feeling toward the United States has been experienced by Mexican citizens and press alike. The belief that the Americans will evacuate Vera Cruz as soon as a duly elected President is installed grows every day.

Kindlier feeling toward Americans is being manifested on all sides. The Mexican press is demanding that reparation be made to all Americans who suffered. The newspapers are insisting that the person who took the statue of Washington statue return it at once.

While some shots have been fired on the edge of the city, it is believed there is no danger of Zapata effecting an entrance. The Government troops are strong enough to hold the city against any Zapatista attack.

CARRANZA PROMISES TO GRANT AMNESTY TO HUERTA TROOPS.

VICTORIA, Mexico, July 22. Via LAREDO, Tex., July 22.—Gen. Carranza to-day advocated leniency in "treatment of the conquered by the victorious Constitutionalists." His statement was made in a speech at a banquet tendered by Victoria citizens. Gen. Carranza said it must never be forgotten that all Mexicans are brothers, but declared he could not extend the hand of brotherhood to those directly implicated in the deaths of Francisco Madero and Pinaro. No leniency, he said, could be expected for those who took an active part in overthrowing the Constitutional Government of Mexico and the murder of its President and Vice-President.

The law would be observed strictly, he said, and those charged with participating in the crime would be judged according to the law.

SENATE BILL HITS AT NOMINATION OF JONES

Hitchcock Measure Would Bar Officials of Offending Trusts From Reserve Board.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Legislation aimed directly at President Wilson's nomination of Thomas D. Jones of Chicago for the Federal Reserve Board was introduced to-day by Senator Hitchcock as an amendment to the trade commission bill. Mr. Hitchcock is one of the leaders of the opposition to Mr. Jones because of his connection as a director of the International Harvester Company.

Senator Hitchcock's amendment would make ineligible to membership of the Federal Reserve Board or for the Federal Trade Commission "or for any other position of honor subject to appointment by the President, any person who is a director, manager, trustee or other officer of a corporation operating in violation of the anti-trust laws of the United States or of any State or resisting in court the enforcement of the same."

No further action on the nomination of Jones was taken to-day.

STRAW VOTE ON GOVERNOR.

Lawyer Remsen Wants to Get a Line on Preference. Daniel E. Remsen, a lawyer and a "Progressive Republican," announces that he is conducting a straw ballot among the members of the New York Bar Association for the purpose of learning who are first and second choices among the candidates for Governor. Postal cards have been sent out, and in making replies the voters are requested not to reveal their identities. Mr. Remsen thinks there is a scientific way of voting by having the candidates' names on the cards. He has invited William B. McCombs, Democratic National Chairman, Charles S. Hill, Republican National Chairman, and George W. Perkins, Chairman of the National Bull Moose executive committee to be present when the votes are counted.
