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ARMY OF ALLIES FORCE BACK BIG GERMAN LINE

ATLANTIC IS NOW OPEN TO COMMERCE WITHOUT ONE SHOT BEING FIRED

Cruiser Suffolk Brings Word, and Ships Will Resume Sailings Beginning on Friday.

R. L. Nosworthy, acting Consul-General of Great Britain in this port, in an official announcement made at his office, No. 17 State street, this afternoon declared that the Atlantic Ocean between the United States and English ports and as far south as Trinidad had been "cleared of the ships of the enemy" and was safe for British shipping.

The acting Consul-General based his announcement on the despatches brought in to him yesterday by the British steamship New York City, which had been stopped outside Ambrose Channel by the cruiser Suffolk and pressed into service as a messenger.

The clearing of the sea had been accomplished "without the firing of a shot," according to Sir Christopher's despatches to the Consulate.

The cruiser Suffolk, flagship of the North Atlantic fleet, came off the harbor yesterday, said Mr. Nosworthy, "and left despatches for this office very reassuring to British shipping. They were to the effect that the West Atlantic is clear as far south as Trinidad, and British shipping can be resumed without fear of danger from the enemy."

"I consulted this morning with British shipping men and conveyed this information to them. All said they would resume shipping at once and carry their usual cargoes."

"The fairway has been cleared without the firing of a single shot. There has been no naval engagement with ships of the enemy on this side of the Atlantic. My despatches come from Admiral Sir Christopher Craddock, in command of the North Atlantic fleet, and are therefore authoritative."

"There are at present five British cruisers off the eastern coast of the United States—the Lancaster, Bristol, Berwick, Suffolk and Essex. They are keeping within reach of the shore and in wireless communication at all times."

At the International Mercantile Marine office an announcement was posted that the New York and Cedric would sail for Liverpool Friday. The Kroonland for London and the M'ne-tonka for London will sail Saturday. Enormous cargoes are being rushed into their holds. The New York will carry refrigerated food. The other three will take thousands of bushels of grain and quantities of canned and preserved stuff.

The White Star freight fleet has been ordered to hasten from far parts of the world to New York in order to supplement these first shipments of the passenger liners.

ROUT OF THE KAISER'S ARMY ALL ALONG THE LINE OF BATTLE REPORTED BY THE BELGIANS

Battle Line Extended 30 Miles from Tirlemont to Tongres—1,000,000 German Troops Sought to Trap the Allied Forces in Heart of Belgium.

Germans Use the Crack Krupp Batteries—French War Office Reports That Kaiser's Troops Are Trying to Pass Stronghold Inside French Border at Luxemburg.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 12.—The War Office announces that the general attack on the Belgian-French centre between Tirlemont and Tongres has failed.

The Germans are declared to have retreated all along the line, with the exception of at one point, where the fighting still continues. The general line is about thirty miles long.

Naval Battle Off English Coast

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Aug. 12.—A telephone message received here from the Isle of Shoals, at 5.30 P. M. to-day, said that a naval battle between a British and a German warship could be seen from the roof of a hotel there.

PARIS, Aug. 12.—It is officially announced that a general engagement is progressing at Tirlemont, Belgium. The German army assaulted the Belgian position there at dawn to-day and the fighting is still in progress.

This is believed to be the opening of the attack directed against Brussels, as Tirlemont is only twenty-five miles east of Brussels on the Geete river.

The War Office announcement says that the engagement is "serious." It adds: "The Belgians are energetically resisting the German attack."

It is understood here that the allied army is being pushed forward to the aid of the Belgians now engaged there. Heavy fighting is also reported at Tongres, thirty miles east of Tirlemont.

The military experts agree that the German army operating against the Belgians and French in the Belgian-Luxemburg district numbers fully one million men.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 12.—Heavily censored despatches from Liege indicate that German siege guns are nearing the Belgian city, and that simultaneously a concentration of the German forces for a final assault on the city is in progress. Some of the German siege guns weigh forty tons.

A despatch from Maestricht to the Telegraaf says terrific artillery firing was heard throughout the morning coming from the direction of Tongres to the north of Liege. The concussion was felt in Maestricht.

Germans Trying to Trap the Allied Army.

LONDON, Aug. 12.—While Gen. von Emmich's three corps continued the investment of Liege to-day another German army crossed the Meuse River near Tongres and is advancing toward Waterloo and Brussels.

This army is believed to be attempting to pass to the northward of Namur and to trap the allied army now there between two German armies, one operating from the north and another operating through Belgian Luxemburg.
