aid Mr. Roosevelt in the Presidential race of 1916. "I always have been and shall continue to be a Republican," he said. "With you, I am proud of our party's history and achievements and its great leaders. The great issue in this State this year is to get rid of the crowd which is now running our affairs, and to re-establish honest and efficient government. It is on that issue and as a Republican that I am a candidate in the Republican primaries for Governor."

"I have not become and am not the candidate of Col. Roosevelt, nor of any other man. Mr. Roosevelt's support of my candidacy was given by him voluntarily without the slightest solicitation from me, and carries with it no personal or political obligation of any kind on my part, either expressed or implied."

"Some fear that my nomination and election as Governor will mean Mr. Roosevelt's nomination for President in 1916. I have no information of any kind that Mr. Roosevelt has any personal or political ambition of the kind, and I promise them that if I be elected Governor, that office will not be used to further any personal or political ambition of Mr. Roosevelt or of any other man, myself included. This argument is being made for the purpose of raising a false issue and thus turning against me the passions and prejudices of those who dislike Mr. Roosevelt. It is not sincere."

### FEDERALS EVACUATE MEXICAN CAPITAL AND WAIT REBELS' COMING

Will Make Last Stand if Constitutionalists Attempt to Loot City, It is Said.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—President Carbajal is on his way to Vera Cruz from Mexico City, according to the State Department. His departure from the capital is for the purpose of permitting a transfer of the government to the Constitutionalists.

The Federal forces have withdrawn from Mexico City and have gone to Puebla. There they will await the entry of the Constitutionalists, and if the latter commit any excesses the Federals will make one last desperate stand at the capital, or just outside of it.

Secretary Bryan to-day said: "The situation is very encouraging and we expect an early and peaceful transfer of power."

Carbajal plans to remain in Vera Cruz until the government has been turned over to the Constitutionalists. Then he will return to the capital. State Department authorities said to-day that Carbajal's departure and return will not be attended by any danger, because of the fact that he is respected by all factions in Mexico. He has held high office there, and has been rated as a non-partisan.

Gen. Villa remains as the one point of contact in the Administration's mind to-day. What he will do in the present situation is problematical. He has it within his power, it is believed here, to shatter not only all of Carbajal's plans, but to obliterate the hope of his Administration for peace in Mexico.

### MAZATLAN TAKEN BY REBEL FORCES.

On board U. S. S. California, Mazatlan, Mexico, Aug. 10 (delayed in transmission)—The evacuation of Mazatlan by the Federal garrison and its occupation by the Constitutionalists forces are complete to-night. Fifteen Federal officers and two volunteers were executed, in the presence of all the Federal prisoners assembled at the customs house to witness the spectacle. One of the doomed men was given time in which to compose a letter to his wife. The city is now quiet.

In the four days fighting around Mazatlan the Federals lost 200 dead and wounded, and the Constitutionalists lost 49 dead and 200 wounded.

11 Hurt in Trolley Smash. CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 12.—Eleven persons were injured, four seriously to-

day, when an Akron to Cleveland limited car crashed head on into an Electric Package Company baggage car near Bedford, fifteen miles south of Cleveland. Thomas Ibbeson, motorman of the limited, may die. The wreck occurred on a single track and it is said Ibbeson failed to take orders to go on a siding.

### WAR CAUSES SUICIDE.

Youth Unable to Get Back to Fight for Kaiser, Kills Himself.

Forced to give up hope of getting back to Germany to help fight for the Fatherland, Hans Bumba, seventeen years old, here a month from Hamburg, killed himself early to-day by inhaling illuminating gas in a furnished room at No. 648 Eighth avenue. He was found unconscious by Policeman Herz, who lives on the third floor in the same house, and died in an ambulance on the way to Bellevue Hospital.

Bumba was working as a porter when Germany went to war. He had only 50 cents, and tried to borrow money enough to take him back to the other side. Unsuccessful in this, he hung about the steamship piers in the hope he could stow away, but the piers were watched so closely that he couldn't get aboard a ship.
