

MATTHEWS CHOSEN BISHOP.
 Minnesota Divine Succeeds Scarborough in New Jersey.
 TRENTON, Oct. 8.—The Rev. Paul P. Matthews of Faribault, Minn., was elected Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Diocese of New Jersey at a special meeting yesterday of the diocesan convention. He succeeds the late Bishop John Scarborough. He received one more vote than was necessary to elect on the fifth ballot.
 Dr. Matthews' closest rival was the Rev. Dr. Bowden Sheppard, archdeacon of the New Jersey diocese.
 The Rev. Paul P. Matthews was born in Glendale, O., and is forty-seven years old. He is a graduate of Princeton University and of the General Theological Seminary, New York. His father, Stanley Matthews, was United States Senator from Ohio and an Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court.

That is a fair description of the way the American fashion designer feels during this hectic time when the launching of new styles are daily events. A pin in the middle of an immense and excessively active wheel, which shoots out rainbow colors in its mad circling!
 Everybody is still rather dizzy from the realization of the big opportunity opened to America, but by this time there are noticeable certain tendencies of the mode which have shaped themselves into proper relationship one with the other. The snug fitting bodice, with long sleeves for daytime and none for evening, accompanies the short skirt, full about the hips and with or without a tunic. These make a person as being "in the fashion"—they achieve the modest "silhouette"—a word which made its way into the dictionary of clothes only a few years ago, and which has been found so significant and expressive that it is there to stay. It gives in one word the sum of all that is most important in what we recognize as giving style to a woman. But within the limits of this outline you can do pretty much anything your fancy dictates and still impress the bachelors as having that ineffable quality of style. The bodice may be short waisted, normal or long waisted, and the tunic may be single, double, triple or more, "according to," as the old ady said in giving a recipe. So long as it reaches to within a few inches of the bottom of the skirt it is all very well. I do not mean to infer that cannot be longer than that, for a matter of fact some very new styles, though perhaps appearing extreme, are so long as to positively usurp the skirt itself. However, the outline of the skirt is visible, as these tunics are usually of some transparent material.

"TO ALTAR OR DEATH," ARMED GIRL'S ORDER TO EX-FIANCIE IN AUTO

Knocks Him Unconscious With Revolver When He Delays—Car Wrecked.

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 8.—"Marriage or Death" was the subject of a melodrama in real life enacted in an automobile on several downtown streets here by Lillian Kreps and Benjamin Werner.
 Werner, who is an automobile dealer, was formerly engaged to the girl. Yesterday at her request he took her out for a ride.
 When they entered Fifth avenue, the principal business thoroughfare downtown, the girl drew an automatic revolver, thrust it against the back of Werner's head, in plain sight of hundreds of persons, and ordered him to drive to the home of an East End minister or prepare to die.
 Werner tried to cajole her, but was curtly told: "It's marriage or death. Drive to the minister's. If you stop or signal a policeman, I'll shoot!"
 Running the car at the lowest speed, Werner sent it through several

more downtown streets. The girl realized that he was playing for time. "You're not playing fair," she cried. "I've changed my mind. I'm going to kill you now and then myself."
 "Don't shoot me on Fifth avenue. Shoot me on Grant Boulevard," said Werner.
 The girl agreed. On the nerve-racking journey she explained that she had five bullets in the pistol for him and one for herself.
 On Grant Boulevard, near Washington street, Werner dropped the steering gear and vaulted into the rear seat, but his strategy failed, as Miss Kreps brought the heavy revolver butt down on his head, opening a big gash and making him unconscious.
 Deprived of guidance, the car ran into an embankment and piled up in a heap. Men seized Miss Kreps. Werner was taken from the wreckage by policemen and rushed to the hospital, where his injuries were dressed.
 Miss Kreps is the daughter of a restaurant proprietor in Elizabeth. Werner is prominently connected here.

and back and up on the sides, or vice versa, they may be of heavier material, with the foundation skirt glimpsed in places where the tunic drops shortest. The most favored materials which are used for the popular one-piece dresses are gabardine, velveteen, satin and broadcloth, combined one with the other. These frocks have assumed a "tailor" appearance, as they have been made to substitute a pattern covers. But the design I am showing to-day, though characteristically severe in line, possesses distinction, aided somewhat by the trimming details. At the left is suggested a delightful use of braiding, which in black would be pretty on a light weight broadcloth frock of green color. The waist, which only bears a semblance of fitting, drops long to meet a shaped band or belt braided in a design, while a corresponding pattern covers a narrow band which outlines the low armhole. Narrow cuffs of black velvet to finish the long tight sleeves add smartness together with the black velvet standing collar. This latter, suggesting the military, is a seasonable touch, as is also the heavy tassel which chooses the point of the belt in front from which to drape itself. And considering the simplicity of the skirt, it is quite the proper place, proving the subtle trimming of a group of tucks through the tunic, be sufficient.

This design would be pretty developed in dark blue gabardine, with either red or black braiding, with cuffs and collar of satin to match. At the right I have shown it affecting a more dressy appearance with the use of velvet and taffeta, with lace sleeves. The lace could be carried out in Corbeian blue silk with black velvet trimming and black lace sleeves, with a characterful touch at the side of the belt in the form of a gold or otherwise fancy buckle.
