

CRUISER KARLSRUHE SINKS 13 BRITISH VESSELS IN THE ATLANTIC OCEAN

Rival of the Emden in Preying on England's Commerce Destroys Ships Having 60,000 Tonnage, and Captures 400 Men in Crews.

LONDON, Oct. 23 [Associated Press].—A despatch from Tenerife, Canary Islands, to the Daily Mail, under date of Thursday, reports that the German cruiser Karlsruhe has sunk thirteen British merchantmen in the Atlantic.

The news was taken to Tenerife by the German steamer Crefeld, which arrived with the crew of the British steamers Strathroy, Maple Branch, Highland Hope, Indrani, Rio Iguaçu, Farn, Nicoto, Maria de Larrinaga, Cervantes, Cornish City, Pruth, Condor and Lynrowan, all of which were sunk by the Karlsruhe.

The Crefeld was accompanied into port by the German steamers Patagonia, Ria Negro and Asuncion.

A later message states that over four hundred men of the crew are prisoners.

The ships were mostly engaged in the South American trade, and their total tonnage is about 60,000.

The cruiser Karlsruhe, of a trifle less than 5,000 tons, has had in this war a career as eventful in the Atlantic as that of her smaller sister ship, the Emden, in the Indian Ocean.

The Karlsruhe first came into notice, at the outbreak of the war, when she appeared in the vicinity of Sandy Hook, apparently in wait for British merchantmen leaving New York. For a few days the British shipping hugged their pier, and then came news that the Karlsruhe had been driven away on the approach of several British cruisers.

On Aug. 9 the Karlsruhe appeared in the harbor of San Juan, Porto Rico, where she coaled and then again took to the sea. Soon after it was learned that the Karlsruhe had been in a running fight at sea with the British cruisers Suffolk and Bristol.

It appears that the British cruisers came unexpectedly upon the Karlsruhe while she was coaling from the German steamer Kronprinz Wilhelm. The cruisers engaged in a running fight while the Kronprinz Wilhelm, through her superior speed, easily escaped. The Karlsruhe also eluded her pursuers, and an unconfirmed report had it that she damaged the Bristol.

Since then the Karlsruhe has appeared in several West Indian ports for coal after preying, in various southern seas, on British commerce. An official statement, given out in Berlin on Oct. 3, said she had sunk seven British steamers in the Atlantic.

The Karlsruhe is a comparatively new ship, having gone into commission early in 1913. She has a speed of 27 knots, being one of the fastest warships afloat. Her speed has enabled her thus far to elude the British pursuit. Her main armament consists of twelve 4.1-inch guns and she carries a crew of 373 men.

Change Housekeeping From a Duet of Maid and Mistress or a Solo to a Chorus, Is Advice of Josephine Story, Authoress Who Has Tried It Successfully.

There need be no "servant problem" in the life of the able-bodied woman who has no small children. Why? Because there need be no servant.

That is the essence of the hopeful and helpful doctrine expounded by Josephine Story in her recently published book, "For the Comfort of the Family." It's bound to be of interest to every woman anxious for the comfort of her own family and weary of trying to maintain that comfort through the casual ministrations of Bridget or Gretchen or Olga. And Josephine Story, who, when she isn't an author, is the mistress of a charming home, offers a fine large supply of definite practice in place of the airy theories so often spun by the domestic economist who lives between kitchenette and a trunk.

The first move in housekeeping without a servant is to make housekeeping a chorus, instead of a duet between maid and mistress or a solo on the part of the latter. "The one promise my men folk extorted from me was that if I found myself getting overworked I was to confess," said Mrs. Cooper in explanation of the beginning of her experiment. Her maid left at the beginning of a summer vacation, and her husband, her two sons and herself decided that instead of the painful search for a new servant they would try dividing up the household duties among themselves. "The husband, having a vacation, became gardener and out-door man; the elder son took care of the floors and windows; the younger boy was waiter and dishwasher while the lady of the house became cook."

And the initial discovery of the lady of the house was the truth inherent in the wise New England advice "to let your head save your heels." "My first move was to watch for wasted minutes as I went about my work," she declared. "By a process of elimination and selection, dust collecting ornaments, furniture, superfluous silver, in fact every article which did not contribute directly to the artistic or material comfort of the family, vanished into the limbo of discarded things. The result of my clearance was a sense of restful spaciousness in the house and a magical increase in leisure moments."

"My next step was to substitute paper for the linen doilies used on the polished table. Then I invested in a dozen large oval doilies to use over asbestos mats, under hot platters, and some large round ones with a lacey edge upon which to unroll a jelly, mousse or parfait. As mine would have been the task of laundering the linen doilies, think what an amount of time, strength and energy I saved by substituting paper."

The lack of proper tools Mrs. Cooper has found to be one of the greatest handicaps of the housekeeper.

A DAB OF POWDER NOW AND THEN IN THE KITCHEN. "The white enamelled shelves of my pantry, where a cook, hot, no unnecessary or imperfect utensil," she averred. "The cereals are in glass jars, labelled. The cook books in their washable slip covers of white linen are in a glass inclosed shelf within easy reach. Fastened securely to that same shelf is a spectacle case, and on top of the shelf is a card index box for recipes. The well sharpened knives, the forks and spoons which are used in cooking are separated and kept in pasteboard box covers on a convenient shelf. KING OF BELGIANS LEADS ARMY UNDER GUNS OF GERMANS

Urged to Leave Front, He Says: "My Place Is on Fighting Line."

By William Phillip Simms. HAZEBROUCK, Northern France (via Havre), Oct. 23.—"My skin is of no more value to my country than is yours. My place is on the fighting line."

That was the reply of King Albert of Belgium to the importunities of his personal staff, who urged him to leave the front. It was my privilege yesterday to see His Majesty in action at [name deleted by censor]. Fighting with the remnants of his little army to defend the last little strip of his native land still held by his own troops, he is still untrifled and unconquered. Garbed in the field uniform of a General, he is constantly encouraging his men at every point.

The Belgian general staff admits that the German attack in southwestern Belgium is the most violent of the present war. The Germans had plainly planned to sweep right through the southwestern end of Belgium and to take Dunkirk with a rush. They would have succeeded if it had not been for King Albert and the remnants of his little army. Driven from Antwerp by an overwhelming German force, compelled to evacuate Ostend to prevent being driven into the water or made prisoners of war, they made their final stand in the vicinity of Nieuport.

The Belgians were fighting with their backs against the wall. They fought like demons. Outnumbered at all times and with artillery greatly inferior to that of the enemy, they have refused to acknowledge defeat at any point. Every German assault has been repulsed with great loss.

The King passed up and down the line of his army. Sometimes he uses an automobile. At other times he is on foot. Addressing his cheering soldiers he uses the familiar "thee" and "thou," usually reserved for members of the same family. He is comforted to the wounded, cheerer to the downhearted.

As the King moved to his headquarters following the repulse of the Germans, he was cheered everywhere. He was wet to the skin from the drizzling rain that had been falling for hours. His uniform was covered with caked mud. His hands and face were streaked with clay.

His appearance was in remarkable contrast to when I last saw him in Paris just before he became King. Then he was boyishly enthusiastic and a smile was constantly on his lips. To-day, as he looked back at the firing line and at the little strip of territory yet left to him, his face was the saddest that I have ever gazed on.

But it was inspiring in its sorrow and it was apparent why his men should love him now, in the greatest hour of his life, more than when he was in the palace.

In the distance the thunder of the guns could be plainly heard. It punctuated the reports being made by his staff officers. There was no fear in his face. His sorrow for the devastation of his country, for the death of so many of his subjects, but he remains confident that in the end Belgium will be restored to her place among nations.
