DEPOSITORS HAND GLYNN PROTEST AGAINST BALDWIN

Governor Declines to Remove Man Making Inquiry at Sing Sing Prison.

A committee of Union Bank depositors, consisting of Dr. J. Ellis Rohrer, Thomas B. Clark, F. H. Grether, Henry Muller and Robert A. Fredham, called on Gov. Glynn this morning to present a remonstrance against Stephen C. Baldwin continuing to act as investigator of the Sing Sing Prison scandal. In a lengthy memorandum signed by Mr. Rohrer it was charged that Sullivan first went to Baldwin for legal advice. It was alleged that Sullivan engaged Max D. Storer upon Baldwin's advice. The memorandum also said "It was believed" Baldwin acted in preparing Sullivan's defense.

Gov. Glynn listened to the statement and discussed the situation with the committee at length. He refused to remove Mr. Baldwin, and assured the committee that there would be action in the case by to-morrow. On leaving the committee said: "We don't object to the Governor, but we do object to Mr. Baldwin. We think he is too closely allied with other interests in the bank. We shall reserve decision as to future action until we see what is done by the Governor."

Referring to the committee's call Gov. Glynn said to the newspaper reporters: "These gentlemen did not seem to understand the precise nature of Mr. Baldwin's investigation. He is appointed under the Moreland act which limits his inquiry into the acts of public officials. He has no power to enter into prosecutions of individuals in the banking case. That is for the District Attorney. Mr. Baldwin is investigating the acts of Warden McCormick. The question now in hand is to find whether McCormick is guilty or not. Mr. Baldwin will go as far into the investigation as the

Moreland act permits. "I told the committee that after he had finished with McCormick if anything developed on which he would have to pass and his former test relations were such as to identify him in doing so, we would get another man. But first comes the McCormick phase and investigation of that is already nearly finished. I expect to have the testimony and report in my hands late to-morrow. I shall begin to read it and by to-morrow morning I expect to render my decision. I sat up until 3 o'clock this morning going over the first day's testimony and I will do the same to-night if necessary. "Either this committee does not understand or does not want to understand how the proceedings are being conducted. Somebody is trying to play politics with them."

LEICESTER HOLME CONTESTS WIFE'S WILL

Former Police Judge, Now Living Abroad, Asserts That She Was of Unsound Mind.

On the ground that his wife, Mrs. Lizzie Hastings Holme, who died in London last June, was of unsound mind when she cut him off without a cent in the will by which she disposed of more than half a million dollars in specific bequests, Leicester Holme, now in London, but formerly a police judge in this city, today began proceedings in the Surrogate's Court here to contest the will.

The will refers to Mr. Holme in the following words: "I have made the

above disposition of my property conscious of the fact that I have a living husband and also other relatives for whom I have made no provision in my last will and testament, and it is my express determination that they shall not have any share or benefit under my will.

THE \$10,000,000 LOAN FOR FRENCH CREDIT HERE

Gold Won't Go Out, but Will Be on Call for Goods Bought in This Country.

The \$10,000,000 French government loan negotiated through the National City Bank for the purpose of establishing a credit account here for the benefit of French purchasers of American goods. No gold will be shipped from this country on account of it.

The difficulty of foreign exchange transactions and the hesitation of Americans to extend credit to foreign customers on account of war conditions had led to this system which in effect a form of French government guarantee or advance deposit on account of future shipments.
