

SUSPECT TWO MEN OF COMPLICITY IN COURT HOUSE BOMB

Police Commissioner Takes Personal Charge of Hunt for Dynamiters.

JUDGE WAS THREATENED

Either White Slavers or Reds Suspected of Effort to Kill Prosecutors.

Police Commissioner Woods has taken personal charge of the police work in the Bronx Court House bomb case, and it is understood two men are under surveillance to-day, and a roundup of suspects is planned. Detectives are working in the Bronx and surrounding districts, but it is said they have no definite clue to the bomb thrower.

There is a difference of opinion as to the origin of the bomb that partly wrecked the new court house. Many of the police officials are inclined to think it was an anarchist demonstration, while the Bronx County authorities are confident the infernal machine was meant for County Judge Louis D. Gibbs and District Attorney Francis Martin, a belief shared by the officials themselves, as a warning from white slavers.

Judge Gibbs has received about thirty threatening letters. Three weeks ago, when the alleged leader of one band of slavers was sent away for twenty-three years he said:

"When I get out there will be a few less judges and detectives in the Bronx."

One member of the band is now in the Bronx County jail awaiting trial, and efforts are being made to get from him a confession that will help clear up the bomb outrage. Commissioner Woods said he is certain the police will find out who set off the explosive, but it may take a long time.

FOUND PAPER RELATING TO CHICAGO ANARCHISTS.

About the only reason for thinking Anarchists had anything to do with it was that in the explosion debris was found a tattered old pamphlet, in Spanish, entitled "Los Martires de Chicago" (the Martyrs of Chicago), containing tiny half-tone pictures of the five Anarchists hanged on Nov.

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BOSTON SCHOOLS BAR ALL "DARKY" SONGS

Negroes Protest and Committee Withdraws Book Containing Them.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 12.—As a result of a protest by leading negroes of Boston against the use in the public schools of songs which contain the words "darker" and "nigger," the Boston School Committee this afternoon voted unanimously to withdraw the book, "Forty Best Songs," recently compiled for school use by James M. McLaughlin, music director.

The School Committee chamber on Mason street was taxed to its full capacity long before 4 o'clock, the hour set for the hearing. Many stood throughout the proceedings. While the larger part of the audience was made up of negroes, there were also many whites. Addresses in favor of the petition for the withdrawal of the book were made by Moorfield Storey and Francis J. Garrison, the only surviving son of William Lloyd Garrison.

FIVE WHITE SLAVERS HAVE BEEN CONVICTED.

Five of these men have been brought to trial, convicted and sentenced to terms ranging from three years and six months to twenty years and six months.

Since the arrest of these five men on July 3 Judge Gibbs has received no less than thirty threatening letters. All but one of them he threw away. The one he saved, and which has been turned over to Acting Capt. Andrew U. Wines of the Bronx Detective Bureau, was written in Italian and offered every indication of having been composed by a man of education, although the writer made the error of writing "John" for "Elizabeth," the Austrian Empress who was assassinated. It was mailed July 26 at 7:30 P. M. from Station A, 26 and Prince streets, and read: "Honorable L. D. Gibbs, Judge of the County of Bronx, City: The author of this has been in court watching the Judge and District-Attorney while innocent men are being prosecuted for crimes. Swift justice will be meted out and the same fate accorded you that was to King Humbert and the Empress Josephine of Austria.

"All year," said District-Attorney Martin, "I have been proceeding with special vigor against carriers of concealed weapons, and none of those convicted before Judge Gibbs has escaped without a prison sentence. We have had the satisfaction of seeing 'gun fights' decrease from an average of one a week until since Jan. 1, but one killing has resulted and but one other has been attended by serious wounding."

"The proportion of Italians among these men," Judge Gibbs interjected, "has been about 10 out of every 100."

"During the trials of the traffickers in women," the District-Attorney resumed, "the corridors and the court room were filled with friends of the prisoners, all of whom were Italian. Their attitude was always threatening, and while no spoken threats came from them, they did repeatedly write threatening letters and warnings to Judge Gibbs and myself alike. I am satisfied that it is from such a source as this that the bomb came."

DOES NOT BELIEVE ANARCHISTS DID IT.

"My inquiries," said Judge Gibbs, "have brought to light no meeting of Anarchists in the Bronx Wednesday. There has been no case in my court that involved Anarchists in any way that appeared on the surface, and the only ground that I can see for thinking that they may have been behind this is that the Anarchists have steadily been making their way northward through the city."

"But whoever was responsible fell short of his purpose. No life was claimed, and it will take more than a firecracker to swerve me from my purpose of making the streets happy and unhealthy for men of the sort to whom I have been paying my respects."

One other indication that friends of the five Italians were at the bottom of the affair was found in the fact that on July 16 City Marshal John C. Hoefling received a "fake" bomb. It was Hoefling who found Mrs. Hanson in the One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street house, and so brought about the arrests.

The tattered pamphlet seemed to Commissioner Woods, he said, an indication that Anarchists were responsible. His opinion was strengthened by the fact that the bombs exploded on Oct. 13 in St. Patrick's Cathedral and St. Alphonsus's Church marked the anniversary of the execution of Francisco Ferrer, the Spanish Liberal.

CORNELL YOUTH DROWNS IN 30-FOOT RESCUE DIVE

Schwarzbach, Unable to Swim, Takes Daring Plunge After Sister, Who Is Saved.

ITHACA, N. Y., Nov. 12.—In trying to save his sister, Miss O. P. Schwarzbach of Brooklyn, Paul L. Schwarzbach, nineteen years old, sophomore in the State College of Agriculture at Cornell, dove thirty feet from the cliff of the Beebe Lake George here last night and was drowned.

The two were members of a party of Cornell students who were enjoying an outdoor dinner by freight near the gorge. Miss Schwarzbach, not knowing the edge of the gorge was near, stepped off the side and fell into the water. Her brother dove to rescue her. She could swim and was pulled out with a rope. He could not swim and was drowned before comrades could get to him. His body was recovered. This is the third fatal accident at the spot.
