Went Direct to Road and Got Desired Improvements in Brooklyn.

Direct action by an outraged public and fear of mandatory legislation have at last won from the B. R. T. improvements in traffic conditions in southern sections of Brooklyn.

Notice was given to-day by the B. R. T. that beginning Monday a number of improvements and extensions in service would be made on lines running out of the Ninth avenue terminal, covering an extensive area.

"We have waited on the Public Service Commission until the situation grew hopeless," said Mr. Beer. "Some of our grievances have been pending for five years without relief."

BIG CROWD WATCHES GLENDALE PARK FIRE

Dance Hall, Shooting Gallery and Merry-Go-Round Destroyed—\$50,000 Damage. A fire that lighted up the country for miles around and kept residents of the sparsely settled neighborhood busy with flying embers until 5 A. M. to-day, raged the dancing pavilion, shooting gallery and merry-go-round in Glendale Schuetsen Park in Myrtle avenue, Glendale, just outside the Brooklyn line, doing \$50,000 damage.

The park, the largest picnic grounds in the greater city, was closed Sept. 21 and had no night watchman. It is owned by the V. & Z. Brewing Company of Brooklyn and is leased by John Gerken. The only person on the grounds were George Buk and wife, keepers, who were asleep in the hotel, three hundred feet from the burning building, and were in no danger.

Two alarms were sent in for the blaze, which was discovered by some one on a passing surface car about 11.45. The flames drew a large crowd, including scores of persons in automobiles. Firemen spread over the district to extinguish embers.

500 INSTRUCTORS GIVEN CHANCE FOR PROMOTION

Decision of State Commissioner Ends Two Years' Delay in Filling Teachers' Vacancies.

By a decision of State Commissioner of Education John H. Finley to-day, five hundred vacancies in teachers' positions in this city will be filled after a delay of two years. During that time the positions have been temporarily held by teachers paid the salaries of lower grades.

BLAZE NEAR SKYSCRAPERS.

Smoke in great volume poured out of the vacant lot at Nos. 48 and 50 Broadway, where the old Tower Building used to be, and poured through the windows of skyscrapers and clouded Broadway.

J., Nov. 14.—William Barrett, a lineman's helper, fell to his death from a pole here to-day when motion lead which he was using spat-tered on his face, causing him to lose his grip. He was twenty-four years old and lived at No. 504 Twelfth avenue, Newark.

LAST OF THE BLAKES GOING HOME TO JOIN THE BRITISH ARMY

His Grandfather, Father and Three Brothers Have Fallen on the Fighting Line.

The Cunard steamship Orduna sailed this morning for Liverpool with 854 passengers, most of them English reservists going home to join the colors. The American liner St. Paul carried 600 passengers, most of them of the same sort.

In the second cabin of the Orduna was a tall, blond youngster, Lawrence F. Blake, with blue eyes, pink cheeks, a tiny mustache and a diffident manner. He is very slow of speech and his story had to be pried out of him word by word.

"I'm the last of the Blakes," said the youngster, "and I may as well get into it. I've been with an engineering firm at Kansas City for the last year, but when I heard of the death of my last brother, of course, that decided things for me."

TWO GANGSTERS CAUGHT; BOY CARRIED BIG GUN

Police Expect to Find Man Who Shot Innocent Girl Bystander.

As a sequel to the raid of the police yesterday on the membership of the Tanner Smith and Owsney Madden hoodlum gangs of the lower west side, William McNamara, known to his Tanner Smith brethren as "Brother Mac," was arrested at his home, No. 160 Ninth avenue, to-day, as was Robert Shaw, a lad of fourteen, who had a big revolver in his pocket when he was arrested in his parent's home, No. 143 Ninth avenue.

In the pocket of John Haughey, a boy arrested yesterday, the police found a letter addressed to Tanner Smith at his present address, Sing Sing prison. In it the recent battles of Tanner Smith's band were boastfully related. It was told that "Brother Mac," who was making a popular leader of the gang in Tanner's absence, was about to revenge the stabbing of a friend by one of the Owsney Madden crew.

AUTO IS WRECKED IN GALE.

Wrecked on Wheel and Is Killed. (Special to The Evening World.) BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Nov. 14.—Harry Goodhead, twenty-six years old, died at his home in Millford early to-day, from injuries sustained when his auto was wrecked some hours before in a gale of wind. Carlton Quirk, who was riding with him, was badly crushed and will probably die.

MAN TWICE ACCUSED IN MURDER MYSTERY DIES IN WOODHAVEN

John Andrews Central Figure in Notable Trials at Warren, Pa.

John M. Andrews, twice tried for a murder in Warren, Pa., in Jan., 1911, and on his second trial acquitted, died of pneumonia yesterday at his home, No. 814 Diamond avenue, Woodhaven, L. I.

Andrews, his wife and two small children had come to Woodhaven from Philadelphia three months ago and lived quietly; but of the neighbors knew that Andrews had once been the centre of a sensational murder mystery.

Pending his retrial, a Warren woman, Mrs. Stella Hodge, came forward with a confession that she had accidentally shot Amann while riding with him in the buggy and had kept silence, fearing indictment for murder. The woman's tale, which was circumstantial, carried no weight with the authorities. Andrews was tried again.

Mrs. Lillian Shelton Gets Divorce. An interlocutory decree of divorce was granted in the Supreme Court at Mineola to-day by Justice Manning to Mrs. Lillian Cobb Shelton from William G. Shelton, President of the Shelton Electric Company of No. 30 East Fortieth street. The Sheltons, who had a country place in Stewart avenue, Garden City, separated last summer.
