

CRONER'S ARREST FOR CONTEMPT IS ASKED BY PROBER

Wallstein Applies for Order to Compel Hellenstein to Answer Questions.

Leonard M. Wallstein, Commissioner of Accounts, who has been probing into the Board of Coroners at the direction of Mayor Mitchell, today applied to the Supreme Court for an order for the arrest of Coroner Herman Hellenstein for contempt in refusing to answer questions put to him during an inquiry into his office.

Justice Vernon M. Davis, upon the application made by Corporation Counsel Polk, signed an order directing Hellenstein to show cause on Nov. 17 at 10.30 A. M. in Part I of the Supreme Court why he should not be arrested.

Many charges against the Coroner are set forth in the application, together with the questions which he refused to answer on the ground that Wallstein had no authority to inquire into the conduct of his office. The

charges are summarized as follows: That he has failed to comply with the administrative practice of the Coroner's office.

That improper, inadequate, insufficient and inaccurate statements as to the causes of death have been authenticated by the signature of Hellenstein.

That he has failed to direct that autopsies be made where they were necessary to ascertain with reasonable certainty the cause of death, and that he has failed particularly in one case wherein the liability of insurance companies upon policies issued by them on the deceased was dependent upon the question as to whether deceased had come to his death by suicide or natural cause.

That while occupying his office, Coroner Hellenstein has solicited from various insurance companies, employment by them or in their behalf in spite of the fact that the insurance companies were interested in certain cases pending.

That he has failed to subpoena witnesses at inquests when he knew they were available and necessary.

That he has participated in the concealment of the identity of an individual in a case which came to him officially wherein the said individual could, by the finding of the coroner and jury, have been charged with civil or criminal liability.

That he has taken cases from other coroners where his friends were interested in the proceedings or in the outcome of them.

That he has suggested the appointment of certain counsel to appear at inquests.

That he has grossly misstated the law to jurors sitting before him.

"WHITE CROSS" SOCIETY FORMED IN "THE STREET"

"Charity Begins at Home," Is Slogan of Red Cross's New Rival.

A crowd choked Broad street in front of No. 50 from noon till 1 o'clock today. A man stood on a borrowed stool in the middle of the street, and there the American White Cross Society was born. Its motto is "Charity begins at home," and it has declared war on the Red Cross and the Rockefeller Foundation.

Francis Low, an ex-soldier, of No. 3 West One Hundred and Third street, put an advertisement in the Sunday papers calling a meeting of all former members of the army, the navy, the National Guard and the Naval Battalion, at present without employment. But the owners of the building at No. 50 Broad street wouldn't let the 144 men that answered meet there. They moved over to the Stevens House, No. 19 Broadway, with scores of added followers, but the police were called. Then Low got a permit to hold a meeting on the street.

He says there are 1,500 former soldiers and sailors in New York unable to get work, so the White Cross is organized "to demand employment from reserve banks, bankers, brokers, railroads, steamship companies, manufacturers, city and State governments, trusts and other large employers of labor, skilled and unskilled, for men who have faithfully served their country in time of peace or war; to discourage any further collections by the American Red Cross from charitable inclined men and women for relief abroad until the deserving widows and orphans of soldiers and sailors or unemployed of either class are provided for at home; to prevent the Rockefeller Foundation or any other so-called American foundation sending money or supplies to Europe until an equal amount is set aside for the American White Cross for the relief of those suffering at home."

Until the latter aim is accomplished, Low told the crowd, the White Cross was going to picket—peacefully and in a military way—the headquarters of these charities. At noon to-morrow the members will begin their march at No. 26 Broadway, the Rockefeller Foundation.

"It's not going to be an Upton Sinclair or I. W. W. roughhouse," Low insisted. He explained the marchers would circle the block—Broadway, Beaver Street, New Street and Exchange Place—so as not to run afoul of the police. Across the street from No. 26 Broadway will be a "mass-pot" for contributions. The marchers will wear no insignia except their buttons as army or navy veterans.

Later they propose to picket the office of Jacob H. Schiff, treasurer of the Red Cross, at Kuhn, Loeb & Co.'s office, No. 53 William Street, and at

ward Andrew Carnegie's home will be picketed. Hot coffee will be served all pickets, who remain on duty two hours or more.

After the street meeting to-day the pickets go together and Low planned a call this afternoon on Mayor Mitchell at the head of a committee of five to ask his help in securing employment for the ex-soldiers and sailors. Low said they were going to elect the Mayor, treasurer of the White Cross. He has already presented a petition to the Board of Estimate asking that the old City College at Twenty-third street and Livingston Avenue be set aside for the use of the White Cross and expects a decision Friday. He proposes to furnish engineers and stokers, etc., to heat and run the building, so that members of the White Cross can use it as a lodging house.

METZ'S SKULL FRACTURED.
Investigate Death of Brooklyn Representative's Brother.

NEWARK, Nov. 15.—An autopsy performed to-day by County Physician McKendle shows that Samuel Metz, forty-five, a brother of Representative Metz of Brooklyn, and former Comptroller of New York, died last night as a result of a fractured skull. Just how he received that fracture the Prosecutor's detectives are now investigating.

Metz died suddenly in the cafe of William Hohler, No. 41 Waverly Avenue. He asked permission to rest in the saloon and a few minutes later was found dead.

Metz lived at No. 125 Quilman street. His family lived at No. 111 Elizabeth Avenue. Metz was employed in New

York City as a traveling salesman. Mrs. Metz said to-day that Representative Metz will personally look into the facts concerning his brother's death.

Hohler, the saloon proprietor who found Metz dead, and Charles Wolpert of No. 125 Quilman street, were questioned by the police.
